OFFICIAL NEWS.

March 5, 1920.

Application having been made to Government by Dr. Longfield Smith, Agronomist in Charge St. Croix Agricultural Experiment Station, for counsel to defend him in libel suit instituted against him by a St. Croix Sugar Factory for alleged libelous statements made in connection with the performance of his duty, Governor Oman today answered the application by stating the local government would be pleased to show Dr. Longfield Smith the courtesy of rendering him legal assistance as an official of one of the Departments of the United States Government and that First Lieutenant Leo F. S. Horan, U. S. Marine Corps, one of the Government's Attorneys, has been detailed to render the necessary legal advice and assistance in the matter in question.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Feb. 28th.--The Press reception of the Home Rule Bill is rather mixed, but the "Times" recognizes the Bill as being based upon sound principles, within limits, but says that it conveys the impression that the framers had not the full courage of their convictions.

London, Feb. 28th.--The reply made by Mr. Lloyd George and M. Millerand to President Wilson's latest communication on the Adriatic question, repeats the assurance that they never had any intention of a definite settlement without obtaining the views of the United States Government. The reply which is dated February 23th, states that the absence of an American representative had proved in practice an almost insurmountable obstacle to the success of the negotiations. The Premiers take note, as a fact of great importance, but President Wilson's expresses his willingness to accept any settlement mutually agreeable to Italy and Jugo Slavia regarding their common frontier in the Fiume region, provided such an agreement is not made on the basis of compensation elsewhere at the expense of the Nationals of a third power.

London, Feb. 28th.--The decision not to oust Turkey from Constantinople was reached by the Allied Supreme Council only after long consideration of the difficulties in the Turkish situation, Mr. Lloyd George declared in the House of Commons to-day when the question of the future of Turkey was brought up for debate. The decision, he said, was in the balance and after weighing carefully all the argumental, pro
