TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 14th—All the members of the French, Belgian and Italian Delegations to the Allied Conference on Reparations express themselves optimistically regarding the results expected to be produced by the conference. Violating the opinionism felt by the French delegation, one of its members declared that France was ready to do everything possible to realise the hope expressed by the British Prime Minister that the unity which marked the relations between England and France during the war would be established by the work of peace. He added that one of the happiest aspects of the situation, on the eve of the conference, was the fact that the French Government and French public opinion, as well as the British Government and British public opinion and the public opinion of the whole world recognised that in the Dawes Plan alone rested hope of peace and the economic restoration of Europe.

Paris, June 15th.—The American aviators today were invited to write their names in the Golden Book at the Hotel De Ville, in which are the signatures of distinguished personages from all parts of the world. They were subsequently received by President Doumergue.

Paris, July 15th.—The Reparation Commission which sat here until late last night before leaving for London decided that the following conditions were indispensable to the carrying out of the Dawes Report. First. The complete transfer by Germany to a trustee, provided by the Experts, of the securities mentioned in the report. Second. The completion
