## St. Thomas News

A mysterious disappearance took place on Monday afternoon of this week, when young Cyril, the four year old nephew of Mr. Felix Padilla of this city, could not be found for many hours. The young child, who is not accustomed to stray further than the yard of his home, was picked up many miles away, by a woman. It was impossible for the child to have walked such a considerable distance in such a short time. The whole affair points plainly to the opinion that he must have been carried there; for what reason and by whom, it is not possible to say up to the present. After an hour had elapsed and the child could not be found, the police were informed, Sergeant Thomas with his men scoured the city in vain. It was four o'clock in the afternoon when the child was missed. An hour later, a woman coming from the road, below Altona, met the child coming from the same direction and was about passing when she noticed it making signs of distress and an anxiety to "get home." After walking a considerable way up the road they were met by the searchers.

Some years ago a woman left her infant child in her room and when she came back it was missing. The infant was found later in the bush many miles away.—*The St. Thomas Times, Dec. 9th.*

## TELEGRAMS.

### ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, Dec. 6th.—The inauguration of the Irish Free State as one of the dominions of the British Empire took place today. The ceremony was simple and unmarred by hostile demonstrations from the Republican minority. The oath was administered to Mr. Timothy Healy, as Governor-General, by the Lord Chief Justice at Mr. Healy's residence in Chapelizod on the Liffey, three miles west of Dublin, and afterwards the new Governor-General administered the oath to Professor Michael Hayes as speaker of the Dail. The ministers assembled punctually at five p. m. Mr. Cosgrave, President of the Dail Cabinet, and Mr. O'Higgins, Minister of Home Affairs, were among the first arrivals and occupied the same seats as in the old Dail Eireann. At 5.10 o'clock speaker Hayes announced that he was authorized by the Governor-General to administer the oath to the Deputies. Mr. Cosgrave was the first one to be sworn and to sign the roll. The form of the oath of allegiance was primarily to the constitution of the Irish Free State and then to King George as the head of the people of the British Commonwealth. Mr. Chiggins and the other Ministers took the oath, followed by the members of the Dail. The oath was administered to each man individually and most of the repetition were audible throughout. When the ceremony was completed Professor Hayes was re-elected speaker and Mr. Cosgrave President. All the labour members were present and took the oath, with the exception of Mr. Gaffney, member for Carlow, who was the only member of the Dail to vote against the con-
