ST. CROIX STATION.

Mullingar Ireland, April 27th.—Fighting broke out this morning between the regular and the irregular Irish Republican forces stationed here, in anticipation of Mr. De Valera's anti-treaty meeting on Saturday. Hostilities continued for two hours, both sides using rifles and machine guns. Various houses were commandeered by the regular or provisional Govt. troops, who are reported to have launched an attack on the irregulars. Great excitement prevails. The fighting began at five a. m. and ended about seven o'clock, one man on each side being killed and it is believed six wounded. Buildings in the neighbourhood bear evidence of the fray.

Genoa, April 27th.—The transportation commission in its final session urgently recommended to the powers the adopting of all possible measures, in concert, to improve the transport system of Europe, and the League of Nations is being asked to invite the nations, whether members or non-members of the League, to work together in technical matters for furthering the cause of transport. The experts insisted that important things had already been done at Genoa in the way of improving conditions, these largely taking the form of arranging for future conventions, and they pointed out that the present convention, including thirty four states, had brought about a knowledge of actual conditions in Europe which they were certain would prove beneficial for future efforts towards ameliorations.

Grenoble, France April 27th.—King Gustav of Sweden was painfully injured yesterday when an automobile in which he was proceeding from Nice to Geneva was struck by a machine owned by a prominent Geneva banker.
