ST. CROIX STATION.

The Western Union Company inform
us as follows: "To curb advices arising
from the free registration of code ad-
dresses and eliminate the large number
of dead registration on the books which
interfere with the prompt delivery of
cables received under live addresses, it
has been decided to make a nominal
charge of two dollars and fifty cents per
annum for registrations in the United
States and Havana, effective November
1st 1919 on which date all present regis-
trations on receipt of the fee above re-
ferred to. All registrations will automati-
cally expire twelve months from the date
of registration and must be renewed.
Thirty days prior to the expiration of any
registration a formal notice must be sent
to the Registrant in order that the sub-
scription may be renewed, if desired.
Registration with one Company will hold
good for both Western Union and Com-
mercial."

Paris, Oct. 24th.—Pierre Tenoir, con-
victed on a charge of having held intel-
ligence with the enemy was executed at
Santa prison at seven o'clock this morn-
ing.

Ottawa, Oct 23rd.—The Government
Bill acquiring the Grand Trunk, passed
the second reading, 91 to 61, after Mr.
Mackenzie's six months' amendment was
rejected by the vote. The clause in the
agreement with the Grand Trunk
entered into in 1908 under which Hal-
ifax and St. John were to receive a

preference of a cent per hundred pounds
on freight shipped through these ports,
rather than through Portland, and which
agreement was never carried out will be
strictly enforced by the Government
when the Grand Trunk is taken over, the
Hon. Dr. Reid announced, before the
vote.

Washington, Oct. 24th. The last Govt.
effort to avert the coal strike set for
November 1st, failed utterly tonight, and
half a million miners will quit work on
the very eve of winter, with the nation's
bins running dangerously low.

London, Oct. 25th.—The ex-German
Emperor and Crown Prince are concern-
ed in an intrigue of the German royalists,
the political correspondent of the "Daily
Mail" asserts. "The ex-Emperor", says
the writer, "is far from leading a life
of detachment from German Affairs.
He has recently seen a number of myste-
rious visitors from Germany and is receiv-
ing many telegrams. He is constantly
in communication with some place in
Germany by telephone, a private line be-
ing attached to his residence across the
frontier. The communications are with
German royalists. The ex-Crown Prince
is also known to be intriguing with Ger-
man royalists, and receiving many sus-
picious visitors. Inquiries on this matter
will be made in the House of Commons
next week.

Washington, Oct. 26th.—Due to the
illness of President Wilson the stay of
the Prince of Wales in Washington, set
for early next month, will be somewhat
shortened. The visit of the Prince of
Wales, it was said by officials, probably
will correspond in length with that of
King Albert and Queen Elizabeth of Bel-
gium who will spend three days here next
week.

Honolulu, Oct. 24th.—Admiral Jellicoe,
Commander of the British Grand Fleet,
arrived here today aboard the warship
New Zealand. He will leave for the
mainland on November 14th. Airplanes
dropped wreaths and flowers on the
vessel as it came into the harbour. Ad-
miral Jellicoe was made the guest of
honour at a reception tendered him by
naval and civic organizations.

Copenhagen, Oct. 25th.—The entire
staff of Leon Trotsky, Bolshevik Minis-
ter of War has been captured at Tsar-
koeselo, according to a naval des-
patch to the National Tidende. Trot-
sky himself escaped by clinging to a
railway car after fleeing from the scene
in an automobile. Troops of the North
Western Russian Army pursued the
Minister and fired upon his car, but
Trotsky succeeded in reaching Petro-
grad. The left flank of General Yuden-
itch's army is reported to be under fire
from the Bolshevik dreadnought Poltaka
which is lying in the Neva River inside
of the limits of Petrograd and is shooting
over the house-tops.

Buenos Aires, Oct. 25th.—Eubonic
plague is raging in all parts of the terri-

tory of Formosa, in the northeastern
part of Argentina, according to advices
received here. The inhabitants are
panic-stricken, many of them having
fled from the district. Medicines are
scarce, and the sanitary station unable
to cope with the situation, has asked
assistance from the National Health
Department.

Trinidad, Oct. 26th.—The following
has been received here from the Jamaica
Imperial Association: "Following res-
olution passed by the Association. Please
communicate the resolution to the Asso-
ciated Chambers of Commerce who have
been asked by cable to join in protest
that the Jamaica Imperial Association,
representing large numbers of producers,
merchants and others in Jamaica, who are
proud of their position as British subjects
protests with all its might against the
suggestion of Lord Rothermere that
some or any of the British West Indian
Colonies should be sold to a foreign Pow-
er to liquidate a small part of Great
Britain's war debt, that this Association
is convinced that the increase of produc-
tion throughout the Empire and a closer
inter-relation between her several parts
thereof will result before long in un-
paralleled prosperity of the Empire as a
whole, will render unnecessary any con-
sideration of parting with any portion of
the Empire towards payment of its obli-
gations."

Jamaica, Oct. 24th.—Quarantine has
been established against all Russian ports
on account of an outbreak of small-pox
at Havana.
