ST. CROIX STATION.

London, June 2nd.—The following appear among the list of honours bestowed on the occasion of His Majesty's Birthday. C. M. G. Lieutenants-Colonel Hon. T. R. St. Johnston, Leeward Islands. O. B. E., Lt-Col. C. B. Harvey, C. R. E. Bermuda. O. B. R. F. E. Reed, Jamaica, M. B. E. G. D. Mackie, St. Lucia. B. E., R. Ward, British Guiana, I. S. O. R. J. Clinckett, Barbados, I. S. O., W. C. Hutchinson, St. Vincent.

St. Johns, N. F., June 3rd.—Mr. W. F. Coaker, until recently Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in Sir Richard Squires' Government and President of the Fishermen's protective union of Newfoundland since its formation fifteen years ago, is made a Knight Commander of the British Empire Order in the King's birthday honours.

London, June 3rd.—The steamer "Graphic" was beached today off Belfast Lough, after a collision with the American steamer "Balsam." The passengers and crew of the "Graphic" were transferred to another vessel after the collision and there was no loss of life. The "Graphic" had on board 200 passengers from Liverpool. The collision occurred early this morning and the "Graphic" was so badly damaged that she had to be grounded off Carrick-Fergus, on Belfast Lough. The "Balsam" was blocking the channel. The "Balsam" with her forepeak filled with water anchored in Lough. Tugs were sent to tow her to Belfast, but this was deemed inadvisable owing to the damages she had sustained.

London, June 3rd.—"We are right glad to see thee Teddy. Thou art a chip of the old block" was the York-

shire vernacular greeting to the Prince of Wales on his visit to Leeds, the friendly words of welcome appearing on one of the numerous street decorations in honour of the visit, which concluded a five day tour of the industrial centres of Yorkshire. Roses were strewn in the roadway and thrown into the Prince's car in the enthusiasm of the reception to the popular Heir to the Throne. 20,000 school children greeted the Prince on Hunslet Moor and 10,000 on the Woodhouse Moor and everywhere in Leeds the people's delight at the Prince's visit was made manifest. Even some of the members of the local labour party, which had placed a ban on participation in the welcoming ceremonies, were present at the civic reception in the City Hall.

London, June 3rd.—Several passengers and members of the crew of the C. P. R. liner Maryale, which went ashore on the coast of Newfoundland, were travelling to Ireland on the "Graphic".

New York, June 3rd.—Mr. Wm. G. McAdoo is expected shortly to announce his candidacy for Democratic nomination for President.

BRITISH RULERS MAKE VISIT.

A royal welcome was accorded King George and Queen Mary of Great Britain from the time they crossed the Italian border until they left Italian soil. The city of Rome was decorated as at no other time since the war, and the reception of the royal visitors by the Italian King and Queen was both brilliant and cordial. The English rulers next made a visit to the pope at the Vatican, who received them with imposing formality. In their short talk the pope expressed special interest in the holy places in Palestine, and the king promised his influence for their protection and preservation. This was the second visit of English sovereigns to the pope since the Reformation, the first being made by Edward VII in 1903. Strong protests were made in London by "loyal protestants," who also requested the withdrawal of the English envoy to the Vatican.—*The Pathfinder*, 26th May
