TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 18th.—Little surprise was expressed in well-informed circles here today, at newspaper report that the Persian Province of Azerbaijan had revolted as a result of the Anglo-Persian agreement. Confirmation of the report of the revolt is lacking.

Wellington, New Zealand, Oct. 18th.—New Zealand's ten million pounds Victory Loan is under-subscribed and compulsion will be resorted to secure the balance.

Melbourne, Oct. 18th.—The "Herald" state that the Commonwealth is to build a fleet of 14 vessels.

Vienna, Oct. 18th.—The Austrian Cabinet, headed by Dr. Karl Renner, resigned, but was reconstituted immediately under Dr. Renner with few important changes.

Paris, Oct. 18th.—Dr. Vornhoff, who claims he can postpone old age by grafting interstitial glands, points out in an article in the Journal today that the internal secretion glands such as the thyroid and supra-renal, continue alive for three hours after the death of the body and therefore advocates that bodies of young and healthy persons killed in accidents should be rushed to special hospitals where patients are suffering from curable maladies. He says the grafting glands could be grouped and put in cold storage, where they can be kept indefinitely. "Unfortunately," he says, "Prejudices and law now prevent this. Our secular customs require that our perishable bodies be consigned to the earth where they slowly and uselessly are consumed."
