her fourth victory in the series. The Resolute crossed the finish line with a broken topmast.

Madrid, June 12th.—Roumania has offered Spain three hundred thousand tons of wheat.

Warsaw, June 12th.—It is reported that the evacuation of Kiev has been completed. The Poles are withdrawing in the region of Zhitomir.

Chicago, June 13th.—Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio was nominated for the presidency on the twelfth instant, by the republican national convention. As his running mate the Convention named Governor Coolidge of Massachusetts.

London, June 13th.—The capture of Melitopol in the Crimea by Genl. Wrangel is reported in a Reuter's message received here from Constantinople. Five thousand prisoners, twenty-seven guns and five armoured trains were taken.

Constantinople, June 13th.—Samad Ferid Pasha, Turkish Grand Vizier, left here yesterday for Paris. The general impression in Constantinople is that Ferid Pasha will not sign the Treaty in its present form, because if he did so his life would be in danger.

Berlin, June 13th.—Herr Fehrenbach, President of the German National Assembly will convoke the new Reichstag on July fourth. Twenty two women members will hold seats in the new Reichstag.

Semul, Korea, June 13th.—Two hundred armed Koreans, who attacked and crossed the frontier into China north of Hang-Yeng, were defeated in an encounter which ensued, losing 24 killed.

Newport, Rhode Island, June 13th.—The Vanitie scored her third victory in the seventh race with the Resolute on Saturday by four minutes and eight seconds (corrected time). The eighth race of the series will be sailed on Tuesday.

Rome, June 16th.—The new Cabinet, presided over by Signor Giolitti, included Count Sforza, Foreign Affairs, Bonnoni, War, Sechi, Marine and Tedeso, Finances. With the exception of the "Avanti" the press unanimously approves the constitution of the Cabinet, declaring that all parties have confidence in the new Premier.

London, June 16th.—An Ottoman peace delegation comprising ten persons has arrived here from Constantinople.

Coblentz, June 16th.—General March, Chief of Staff of the United States Army, has completed his tour of inspection on the Rhine, which it is believed will have excellent results, he being in favour of maintaining the American forces on the river.
