LOCAL.

The mail-boat Creole sailed for St. Thomas this morning, but it is not assured that she will return before next week Wednesday, the regular schedule day of arrival from St. Thomas.

The Korona on the way to Frederiksted passed this port at about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and is advised as having left the other town for St. Thomas and New York, some time last night.

The s. s. Guiana is now advised as having sailed from New York on Saturday morning the 18th. and is, therefore, not looked for in Frederiksted before tomorrow.

Several cases of Danish Pilsener Beer were released from bond yesterday the customs authorities having been advised by radio to the effect that the beer could be imported. This beer is being sold at something like 50 cents a bottle and has been bought as though people were famishing for it.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 17th.—Edwin Fischer of New York who was arrested here today in connection with the explosion on Wall Street, New York, yesterday, was adjudged insane by the local Lunacy Commission and sent to the Hamilton Jail for the time being. It is said his friends wish him committed to the insane asylum, but a despatch from New York stated that an officer was on his way to Hamilton with a subpoena for

Fischer and he will be held until the arrival of the officer. The doctors of the Lunacy Commission stated that Fischer was not responsible for his actions. Dr. McGillivray, one of the commissioners said that Fischer appeared to have an antipathy to Mr. J. P. Morgan and President Wilson, but this was of recent date and the result was of his present mental condition. Fischer had in his possession when taken into custody a copy of "Soviet Russia", a pamphlet published in New York and a certificate showing that he had passed examinations in law in New York. He also had several post cards similar to those published containing warnings that Wall Street was going to be blown up.

Toronto, Sept 18th.—Following a week or so of preliminary meetings and the big mass meeting of welcome of Hall last night, the ninth congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire opened its business sessions this morning in the Convocation Hall of Toronto University. Lord Desborough presided. The delegates assembled included prominent members in the business and industrial world from Great Britain and the Dominions beyond the seas and from many cities in Canada. There are before the congress a large number of resolutions along the line of development of trade within and without the empire but particularly with a view to the building of imperial ties and imperial relationship by the fostering trade between its component parts. It is expected that the congress will not be concluded until the end of next week.

Constantinople, Sept. 21st.—Three members of the Turkish Cabinet have resigned because they have been unable to bring about a compromise agreement with the Turkish Nationalists by which the treaty between Turkey and the Allies may be carried out. Their action makes the selection of a new ministry necessary.

Washington, Sept. 21st.—A hurricane warning on the west Louisiana coast and on the Texas coast from Port Arthur to Corpus Christi was issued today by the Weather Bureau. The warning said a tropical storm in the Yucatan channel was advancing north-westward and was attended by "dangerous winds." Necessary warn all interests, said the announcement. Following a warning that a gulf storm is approaching a number of transients left Corpus Christi this morning. The majority of the people however intend to remain but are preparing to move to higher ground in case of necessity. A tropical storm last year struck the main land at Corpus Christi killing several hundred persons and causing property damage.

London, Sept. 21st.—Lord Mayor MacSweeney passed a very restless night at Brixton Prison, where he entered this morning the 40th day of his hunger strike. He had some sleep but it was

quite fitful. He was very weak this morning the bulletin stated.

Belfast, Sept. 21st.—Following a display by Ulster volunteers today armed and disguised men in uniforms attacked several premises in Carrick-on-Shannon, County Leitrim, and caused considerable damage with rifle fire and bombs. Reports from Scarl, County Clare, state that reprisals have been taken on that village for the wounding of two constables. Similar scenes occurred in Abbeyfeare, County Limerick, where the local temperance hall was burned, a pharmacy damaged and the windows of houses smashed in reprisal for the death of a constable on Saturday.

London, Sept. 20th.—Sir William Beveridge, Director of the London School of economics, believes that the country is entering on a period of bad trade and severe unemployment. The present period of decreasing trade is chiefly due to inflation of credit, he said which caused prices to go up. Heavy taxation is another obvious cause.

London, Sept. 20th.—There was little hope tonight that the strike of the coal-miners set for September 27th. could be averted. The Executive of the Miners Federation had another long conference today with Sir Robert Horne, but no agreement was reached on the question of increase of two shillings per day in wages as demanded by the miners.

Paris, Sept. 20th.—Poland and Lithuania have agreed to suspend hostilities pending an inquiry and decision of the issue at stake by the Council of the League of Nations, it was announced here this morning.

Toronto, Sept. 20th.—Recognition of the importance to the British Empire of the Congress of the Chambers of Commerce now in session here was emphasized by the King in a cablegram read at the Congress this morning in acknowledgement of the loyal greetings expressed by the Congress in a cable sent on Saturday. Lord Stamfordham the King's Secretary cabled as follows:—"The King fully realizes that these meetings are conducive not only to the commercial interests, but to the very unity of the Empire and His Majesty wishes that all possible success may result from your deliberations". The congress discussed this morning the creation of a permanent bureau of standardized information on all colonial methods of valuing imports and exports and decided on its establishment. Mr. Sheldon of Australia, commenting on the formation of the Imperial Shipping Committee, expressed disapproval of the exclusion of the dominions and dependencies from membership in the committee. A resolution which was passed, added to this protest a demand that the British Govt. afford the dominions an opportunity to nominate their representatives of shipping and trading interests to serve on the committee.
