

to settle the future of Ireland, adjourned at one-thirty o'clock this afternoon, after having been in session an hour and a half.

Sofia, Oct. 12th.—The trial of Bulgarians accused of war crimes opened yesterday in a theatre here, which had been specially fitted up for the occasion. The court-room was crowded to capacity. The accused men included ten former Cabinet Ministers and three Generals. They are charged with high treason in favour of Germany, and the appropriation of public funds. The public prosecutor is demanding the death penalty for most of the defendants. Statesmen and diplomats, to the number of 190, have been subpoenaed as witnesses. The Judges, who were selected by the people all are simple peasants. They sit on benches, dressed in their picturesque national costumes.

New York, Oct. 13th.—The New York Nationals won the World's Baseball Championship here today, defeating the New York Americans by a score of 1 to Nil. The score of games is, Giants 5 Yankees 3.

London, Oct. 14th.—A protocol of agreement regarding the dispute between Austria and Hungary over the ownership of Burgenland, the strip of territory in West Hungary awarded to Austria by the Trianon Treaty, was signed today, according to a despatch from Venice to the exchange Telegraph Company.

Fort Worth, Texas, Oct. 13th.—Fire virtually wiped out the oil town of Eliasville in Young County this morning. Only four or five buildings remain in the business section of the town, according to a telephone message from South Bend.

Paris, Oct. 13th.—The Cabinet today officially completed the French delegation to the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and far eastern questions. Former Premier Viviani will be second to Premier Briand Senator Albert Sarraut, and M. Jusserand, French Ambassador to the United States, completing the delegation.

Rome, Oct. 13th.—Italy's delegation to the conference on limitation of armaments to be held in Washington, will leave on October 24th, it is announced by the Giornale D'Italia.

Gloucester, Mass., Oct. 13th.—The Elsie, a schooner out of Gloucester, today won the title as the fastest in the fisheries of New England and her selection as the racing representative of the United States in the International match to be sailed with a Canadian Champion off Halifax N. S. nine days hence.

London, Oct. 13th.—As a means to revive world trade and help other nations to buy British goods, Sir Peter Rylands, President of the Federation of British industries, is urging a stabilization of exchange rates, even if "we have to bring pressure to bear" upon

other nations. The crushing burden of taxation, he says, is at the root of the British commercial trouble and he thinks this country has been too precipitate in paying its debts. He suggests that Britain should re-borrow the money repaid last year, to ease taxation for everybody. Sir Peter contemplates calling for a conference of leading bankers to formulate a definite trade policy.

Glasgow, Oct. 13th.—The British plans for trading with Russia have been defeated, it was declared by Sir Robert Horne, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in an address here last night. He said that this was partly the result of the Russian famine and could be attributed in some measure to the fact that Russian extremists have been "more anxious to spend their gold in propaganda than in buying goods". Sir Robert disclaimed lack of sympathy for Russia and asserted that he had tested the loyalty of his friends by concluding the trade agreement with the Soviet Govt. He added he was prepared to defend that agreement because he believed the world would never recover until Russia was again producing grain and also because he believed the best way to break down Bolshevism would be to penetrate Russia with honest commercial methods. "Nothing can be gained by sending goods to Russia," he went on, "for it is perfectly certain that the Russians have nothing to give in exchange. While they may have accumulated, stocks, they have no means of transportation. Sending of goods to Russia at present would mean making gifts of them and Great Britain is not in a position today to make presents to anyone".

London, Oct. 13th.—Thousands of England's unemployed assembled on the Embankment this afternoon for the purpose of accompanying a delegation to Mr. Lloyd George's official residence in Downing Street, to demand work or maintenance at trade Union rates of wages and uniform scales of relief. The deputation was allowed to proceed to its destination and was admitted to the Premier's residence. Elaborate police precautions were taken by the authorities of London to cope with the demonstration.

London, Oct. 15th. The conference of Sinn Fein leaders and members of the Cabinet convened at 11 o'clock this morning in Mr. Lloyd George's official residence in Downing Street, with the view of reaching an agreement as to a basis for a settlement of the Irish question, adjourned at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon until 3.30 p.m. Monday. While the conference was in session today Desmond Fitzgerald, the Sinn Fein Minister of propaganda, said that no hitch in the negotiations thus far had occurred and that the Sinn Fein delegates anticipated prolonged proceedings.

London, Oct. 14th. Speaking at the annual meeting of the Colonial Bank,

the Chairman Mr. Wood, complained of the lack of adequate shipping facilities to the West Indies. He considered that at the present time when abundant shipping was lying idle, was appropriate for reconsidering the question of a subsidized service.
