CUTS OUT OWN APPENDIX

Should everyone suffering from appendicitis follow the example of Dr. I. O. Kane, of Kane, Pa., surgical operations may be personally performed "while you wait." Dr. Kane, who is 60 years old and has been a surgeon 37 years, during which time he has operated on nearly 4000 appendicitis cases laid himself on the operating table and while a nurse propped up his head with pillows so he could see he calmly cut open his abdomen. The tissues were carefully dissected and blood vessels closed as the surgeon approached his appendix. On locating this troublesome organ he pulled it up, cut it off and bent the stump under. He administered a local anesthetic himself a few hours after the operation announced that he was doing nicely. Some time ago Dr. Kane amputated one of his own fingers. — *Ibid.*
