

discriminate fighting and revolver shooting there spread to other districts the police and Egyptian troops quelled the disturbances by three o'clock in the morning. At seven o'clock many incendiary fires broke out over the town, but all were quenched or controlled by noon. At three o'clock in the afternoon the total casualties numbered 23 killed and 130 wounded, including 3 native policemen seriously wounded. There were no British civilian or military casualties. Firing from Balconies by Europeans and natives continues. The General Officer Commanding issued the proclamation threatening to open fire on such houses with Machine Guns. The police have made a large number of arrests. The troops are taking up new positions for the night.

London, May 23rd.—Outwardly the industrial position arising from the miners strike remains unchanged. Many possible plenipotentiaries made journeys to different parts of the country during the week-end but both the coalowners and miners insisted that nothing tangible in the way of a settlement has yet revealed itself. A belief grows that the miners are willing to accept arbitration if an arbitrator who commands their confidence can be chosen, but on the other hand the coal owners show a tendency to stiffen their backs. Nevertheless the hope persists that a conference will be arranged this week. The Glasgow extremists have resolved to continue their efforts to prohibit the handling of imported "blackleg" coal. At the same time, Mr. Wilson, the noted leader of sailors and firemen's union, speaking at Hull, declared that if the Triple Alliance had ordered a general strike, only 50% of its adherents would have obeyed. The seamen's leader further alleged that the union's embargo had fizzled out everywhere. "The sooner the extremists drop such tomfoolery, the better it will be for labour and every body else", Mr. Wilson declared. Sir MacKay Edgar, who has returned from a journey through the industrial districts in the north of England, says, the strike has done some good, bringing home to the industrial population the fact which the country is up against. The workers will now, he thinks, realize that it is better to have lower wages, than none at all. Mr. Davison, M. P. for Smethwick and a leader of the Ironmoulders Union, who has been on an industrial mission to the

"We must wake up, if we are not really to become a decadent nation", Mr. Davison declared. It is understood that the London tramworkers have voted against a strike to support the power-workers refusing to handle "blackleg" coal.

London, May 23rd.—The immediate cause of today's rioting in Alexandria, to which the disorders in Cairo were a preliminary, was explained in official circles here as having its basis in the fact that none of the Egyptian Nationalists were chosen on the official delegation coming to London to discuss the future of Egypt. The Premier had refused to appoint the nationalist leader, said Pasha Zagloul, or any of his supporters, as members of the delegation which now is on the way to England. While Zagloul did not participate in the disturbances it was asserted in these circles that he was active in stirring up dissatisfaction among the people and was attempting to defeat the programme of Adly Yezhen Pasha, the Egyptian Premier, by violence.

New York, May 24th.—The raw sugar market was firm and unchanged early today at 5.02 for centrifugal but no sales were reported. Raw sugar futures were quiet and prices showed little change, leading positions being unchanged to one point net lower at noon. Refined sugar was unchanged at 6.30 to 6.50 for fine granulated a fair inquiry being noted.

London, May 24th.—Extreme Caution is being observed respecting the Miners dispute and Mr. Lloyd George did not make the expected statement in the House of Commons today, negotiations for a settlement, however, are still proceeding and it is expected that a conference will be held this week. The Cabinet discussed the matter today. Signs are not wanting that in the absence of an agreement, a partial collapse of the strike is imminent as the miners are said to be short of funds, and are eager to resume work. A typical example of the cost of the strike is shown in Yorkshire. There the Miners Union have paid out 400,000 pounds sterling directly out of Union funds in addition to an issue of one million credit coupons in various amounts while the union is about 30,000 pounds in debt.

London, May 24th.—Germany's reply to the representatives of Great Britain and France for an embargo against the entry of troops and ammunition in upper Silesia is generally regarded in official circles here as satisfactory. A disposition is noted on the part of Poland to control the insurgents occupying the disputed area. The considerations, to-

gether with the dispatch of between 3,000 and 4,000 British troops from the Rhine, which are preparing to move, is inspiring a more hopeful attitude towards the Silesian problem. A final settlement however awaits a meeting of the Supreme Council which will probably be held in Boulogne at the end of this week.

Berlin, May 24th.—A new Govt. order, operative today, imposes a maximum fine of 100,000 marks for illegal recruiting or for organization of military bodies. Other orders issued completely close the Upper Silesian frontier and forbid the formation of armed troops for action in Upper Silesia. The miners of the lower Silesian coal fields have struck and all mines are idle. The trouble is due to a dispute over wages.

London; May 24th.—Sir Edward Carson, who for many years has been the Leader of the Ulster Forces in Parliament has been appointed Lord of Appeal in ordinary, in succession to Lord Mculton who died in March.
