asked, it would have been gladly given. There was no one of his colleagues who would not have been willing to sacrifice any claims in order to secure such reunion of the Conservative Party. Mr. Chamberlain adds that he cannot but believe that Mr. Baldwin had the same wish for the oblivion of past difficulties and complete union of the party for the future but it would seem, he writes, that other forces intervene. He continued. "If complete reunion has not been established, it is not due to any unwillingness on our part to forget past differences, or to any pretensions on the part of us that our inclusion in any new combination was essential". Incidentally Mr. Chamberlain terms Mr. Bonar Law's resignation not only a personal tragedy, but a great national misfortune.

Montreal, May 27th.—78 families were driven from their homes, 150 buildings were destroyed and damage estimated at \$4,000,000 was caused by a fire of undetermined origin that broke out at St. Agatha, about 60 miles from here, on Saturday night. Only one person was slightly injured by the flames, the progress of which was only stopped by the use of dynamite.

Dublin, May 27th.—President Cosgrave's confidence that Ireland is returning to normal conditions has been amply justified by his week-end visit to Kilkenny, which formerly was a disturbed district. There was no need to take extra precautions and when Mr. Cosgrave arrived on Saturday night with only two or three private attendants, he was received by a guard of honor and numerous addresses of welcome were presented to him. President Cosgrave drove in an open car through crowded streets to a hotel, where he took his meals in the public dining room and later moved freely about the city. Today's big open

air meeting was a great success. Mr. Cosgrave devoted his speech to justification of the Government's policy, reiterating that there could be no modification on account of Eamon De Valera's recent negotiations. "We want peace and we want it quickly", he said, "but also we want it secure." Alluding to the necessity of raising a loan to carry out the Government programme, he pointed out that there had been a note-worthy boom in business, which showed that the people were satisfied at the Government's stability, and the outlook, therefore, was promising.

Lausanne, May 27th.—Peace, instead of war, in the Near East was the welcome result of a dramatic session of the Lausanne Conference held yesterday at Ouchy Chateau, to settle the Turco-Greek reparation controversy. Complete agreement was reached and as this was the only remaining problem between the Greeks and the Turks, hostilities, which it was feared might involve the Balkan countries, have been averted. The happy ending of the war threats is expected favourably to influence the remaining Near Eastern negotiations and force an accord on the points still disputed. The essential points in yesterday's agreement are: Greece admits that she owes indemnity to Turkey, while Turkey renounces enforcement of payments. The two powers agree with rectification of the boundary between Eastern and Western Thrace and to restoration of ships seized from one another since the armistice. The Turks agree to waive indemnity, in view of Greece's precarious financial condition and Greece consents to the session to Turkey of Karagatch and the railway from Karagatch to the Bulgarian frontier. The principal delegates, notably Sir Horace Rumbold, Great Britain, and General Pelle, of France, solemnly

appealed to Ismet Pasha, head of the Turkish delegation, to waive all claims to cash indemnities and accept the offer of Karagatch. Mr. Grew, United States Minister to Switzerland, pointed out that both Greece and Turkey were confronted with problems of international organization demanding self-controlled statesmanship. He emphasized that Greece faced the terrible refugee problem and directly needed national reconstruction. It was unthinkable she would abandon this to take up arms. He appealed to both countries, in the interest of their future happiness and prosperity, not to spare efforts at a solution. The settlement followed a lengthy debate, after which Ismet Pasha and M. Venizelos shook hands, sat down and chatted in the most friendly manner. M. Venizelos thanked all the plenipotentiaries for their efforts for peace. Ismet Pasha remarked that he hoped Turkey's conciliatory attitude would help to influence the settlement of the remaining problems between Turkey and the Allies. The Juglo-Slav delegate said he opposed a change in the Thracian frontier, but would not push his objection to the point of endangering peace.

St. Cloud, France, May 28th.—Wm. Johnson of California today defeated J. Washer of Belgium 4-6, 6-2, 6-3 in the final round of the men's singles hard court tennis championship of the world. Suzanne Lenglen defeated Miss Kathleen McCane of England 6-3, 6-3 for the women's title. In the women's doubles Miss McCane and Mrs. Beamish, England, won from Mlle. and Mme. Golding 6-2, 6-3 while in the mixed doubles M. Cochet and Mme. Lenglen defeated J. B. Cillet and Miss McCane 6-2, 10-8. The strain of the hard court tournament may mean the retirement for a long period of Mlle. Lenglen, who collapsed after the last set in the women's doubles in which she and her partner went down to defeat before Miss McCane and Mrs. Beamish. Suzanne after the match said to the Associated Press. "This was a silly stunt of attempting to play three finals in one day. Never again". After she has rested from her activities, Suzanne insists that she will play at Wimbledon, but her mother demurs and declares that the permission of her father must be forthcoming previous to her official entry.

London, May 29th.—The cricket match between the West Indian XI and the M. C. C. which was to have been concluded today at Lords was abandoned on account of rain. It is hoped that the weather will improve so as not to interfere with the match set for tomorrow against Hampshire at Southampton.
