

A Proclamation

BY THE GOVERNOR OF THE VIRGIN ISLANDS OF THE UNITED STATES.

BY virtue of the authority vested in me, I do hereby set apart FRIDAY, MAY 30TH, 1924, and proclaim it a public holiday within the Municipality of St. Croix, Virgin Islands of the United States, for the purpose of observing Memorial Day.

London, May 26th.—The Westminster Gazette says that when the Air Ministry's programme is completed, Great Britain will have six hundred up to date first line airplanes and a similar number of reserves, employed exclusively in defence.

London, May 26th.—Lieutenants Schulze and Cumryn, of the United States Army, have arrived at Plymouth, enroute to Iceland and Greenland, to arrange for the American round-the-world flyers. The airmen cross from England to America by this northern route.

New York, May 26th.—Raw sugar continued heavy today, without further change from the 5.15 level at which 5,000 bags were sold to an operator for early June shipment. Raw sugar futures,

aside from a slight upturn which followed the opening, were generally weak all day under active selling induced by liberal offerings of rays and further declines in refined. New low levels for the year were reported at the close, which were six to twenty points under Saturday's close. September 3.53, December 3.31, March 3.12, all bid. The lowest prices of the year were also noted in refined, with fine granulated being quoted at 6.80 to 6.85 and even at this level there was little demand from the trade. Refined futures were nominal.

Berlin, May 26th.—The Government has resigned. President Ebert accepted the resignation of the Ministry and requested Chancellor Mark to carry on current affairs.

Washington, May 26th.—The Immigration Bill was signed today by President Coolidge. Despite the provision making Japanese exclusion effective next July 1st put into the measure over his vigorous opposition, the President decided, because of other considerations, to give the executive approval necessary to spread the legislation on the statute books.

London, May 26th.—Immense crowds which had been gathering since early morning around Victoria Station gave King Victor Emanuel and Queen Helena of Italy, the Prince of Piedmont and Princess Mafalda a rousing reception upon their arrival this afternoon from Dover, where the Prince of Wales had met them. All the newspapers in their editorial columns express cordial welcome, dwelling upon the Italo-British friendship and alliance during the war and paying tribute to what the House of Savoy had done for Italy. Some of them incidentally laud the achievements of Premier Mussolini.

Barleduc France, May 26th.—In a speech to the General Council of the House M. Poincare announced today that he was not retiring from political life when he resigns from the Premiership next week. He declared he would continue to defend his politics. Declaring he is convinced that the recent national elections did not disavow his foreign policy, "and I am convinced that policy cannot be changed," M. Poincare warned the incoming regime that he and his followers would "watch events with vigilant attention and defend, whenever necessary, the ideals they always have prosecuted. We will demand that general lines of our foreign policy be conserved without alteration," the Premier said, concluding, "I will not depart from the policy I have always followed and which you always have approved. I will remain to the last breath a good Republican and a fervent patriot who will continue to fulfil the mandate you have so many times renewed".

Paris, May 26th.—Suzanne Lenglen, the tennis champion, is suffering from the results of the attack of jaundice she
