SUGAR NOTES.

The difference between a prophet and a profiteer was recently elucidated by one of the writers in this way: A prophet prophesied the world was coming to an end recently, but he did not know what he was talking about. A profiteer on the other hand predicts that soap, shoes and sugar will be higher, and he knows what he is talking about.—*Louisiana Planter, March 6th.*

Brokers in New York got interesting news the first week in February in which the refiners announced that they will receive 7 cents a barrel on sugar sold in the city and 15 cents a barrel outside of the city. This is an advance of from 5 to 7 cents a barrel of 350 lbs.—*Ibid.*
