ately rose and declared that the Irish people had established a republic, and united the Irish people in a regular manner disestablished the republic, it constitutionally went on. This would be a sovereign body in the nation to which the nation looked for supreme government. It was the executive until the people disestablished it. Michael Collins in quiet tones followed De Valera. He said he did not regard the result in any spirit of triumph. He declared that the men representing the Dail, who would be responsible for taking over control of the Irish administration, should get a fair chance in every county, what mattered most was public order and he appealed to the other side to appoint a joint committee of both sides to carry on the government. This was greeted with cheers. Mr. Collins declared that President De Valera held the same place in his heart as ever. Then followed a violent speech by Mary Mac Swiney, denouncing the result as worse than the betrayal of Ireland in the days of Castlereagh. Viscount Castlereagh, Marquis of Londonderry, who was Chief Secretary for Ireland in 1798, was instrumental in carrying the union in 1800. Mr. De Valera rose again, supposedly to reply to Mr. Collins overture. However he took notice to them and merely appealed to all his own supporters in the Dail to meet him in the Mansion House today at one o'clock. This evidently hurt Mr. Collins very much, but he quietly said, "if the visible presence of myself and colleagues is so distasteful, they might at any rate be some accommodation between the parties for the purpose of public order", Minister Burgess immediately retorted, "I will take care that the discipline of the army is preserved". The assembly then separated to meet on Monday morning.

St. Lucia, Jan. 9th.—Addresses in furtherance of the claim form some measure of popular representation in the legislature of this Colony were delivered by 2 members of the deputation of the

Representative Government Association at Government Office this morning. Major Wood replied sympathetically but made no promises. Addresses were presented to him on Columbus Square in the presence of a large and enthusiastic gathering representing all sections of the community. In his reply Major Wood expressed his thanks for the hearty welcome accorded him and expressed a desire to revisit St. Lucia. His reference to the island's historic past aroused intense enthusiasm. Major Wood and party proceed to Soufriere tomorrow and will leave for St. Vincent by H. M. S. Valerian early on Wednesday morning.

Cannes, Jan. 8th.—Representatives of Germany some time next week will come to Cannes to discuss with the Supreme Council of the reparations proposals to be prepared by the Allied statesmen. This was decided upon at the second day's session of the council yesterday, and notification to this effect was despatched to the Berlin Government, stipulation, however, that the German experts go to Paris first and there hold themselves in readiness for the call. The work of the Council showed up today when the thorny reparations questions came up. By the experts it was maintained yesterday that there was an agreement in principle, but the members of the council announced that further deliberation was necessary, after which the experts will report and the Council will make its decision. The experts it is learned, have reached an agreement providing for remission of each payments by Germany, providing for the payment of 500,000,000 gold marks in cash and 1,000,000,000 gold marks in kind each year over a period of years. In the course of the deliberations, Great Britain, in exchange for abandonment of her 22 percent of the first two payments in 1922 asked Belgium to renounce in part her priority claims, so that France can share in those payments, demanding at the same time that France ratify the August agreement

whereby the first billion gold marks, now in the hands of the reparations commission, would be applied to the payment of Great Britain and Belgium occupation expenses, to the conclusion of France. Mr. Lloyd George also resisted all suggestions that action be taken to obtain stronger guarantees from Germany, as asked by France, such as a commission on the German debt to control customs, monopolies and tax receipts.

Bombay, January 9th.—The Prince of Wales shot his first tiger while on a hunt in Nepal Terai. The animal measured nine feet six inches from nose to end of tail.

Tokio Jan. 8th.—Marquis Okuma, the aged statesman, whose condition of coma led to reports of death, was still alive at 5 o'clock this morning.

London, Jan. 8th.—It is reported that from 8 to 10 Esparto paper mills in Scotland are combining, the capitalization of the combine running into millions of pounds.
