TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Paris, May 5th.—Speaking at a banquet given by the Anglo-American Press Association, M. Marcel Huting eloquently praised the English and American journalists and the admirable work accomplished by them in favour of France since nineteen fourteen. He pointed out the fiscal efforts made by France, declaring that her wealth will increase in the future adding, that when the devastated regions have been restored the world will regain its equilibrium partially.

Brussels, May 5th. The 'Etoile Belge' announces that the King and Queen will leave on Saturday for London on a visit to the British Sovereigns.

Paris, May 5th.—Notwithstanding the pressure the Extremists continue to exercise on the workers, the general strike situation sensibly improved still further yesterday. The 'Echo de Paris' states that the members of the Govt. are agreed upon the impossibility of entering upon a conversation with the general confederation of Labour before a general resumption of work has taken place. Up to the present seventy-six strikes of railway workers have been restored.

Versailles, May 5th.—The Delegation arrived here at midnight.

Paris, May 6th.—Herr Mayer, the German Charge d' Affaires has informed M. Millerand that a technical delegation will arrive in ten days time to discuss with French experts the resumption of economic relations between the two countries.

Rome, May 6th.—The death has taken place of Signor Bissolati the well known member of the Chamber of Deputies. He will be given a State funeral.

Brussels, May 6th.—It is authoritative-ly stated that the German Govt. purposes addressing a note to the French Govt. asking that the conference at Spa, arranged for the twenty-fifth of May, be postponed until the German elections have taken place on the tenth of June.

Paris, May 6th.—The Parliamentary conference on the international commerce at a meeting today considering that the high cost of living is caused by the disturbance of the equilibrium in foreign exchange in most countries the high rates seriously embarrassing commerce, and considering also that it is the general interest that the countries tried by the war should recover their productive capacity, expressed a desire for international intervention for the improvement of exchange and to cooperate financially and economically, as largely as possible, with the countries seriously affected by the war, and that in all countries abnormal financial circulation should be reduced. It later advocated that the Governments of Eu-

rope should study the immediate establishment of regular international relations and also that the allied countries should encourage, by all proper means, the establishment of economic relations with the eastern countries of Europe. M. Millerand presiding at the final meeting of the conference expressed satisfaction at the inter-allied solidarity and thanked the conference for its useful work which would be productive of good results.

San Juan, May 8th — General Pershing arrived at San Juan 12.15 p. m. yesterday. He was welcomed by the Governor, the members of the Senate and House of Representatives and Municipal authorities. The streets and water front were packed with people. He proceeded from the pier to the Morro grounds and reviewed the Porto Rico Regiment. After this he was entertained by different organisations ending with a ball at the Porto Rico Casino.

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
