TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 1st.—Mr. Lloyd George and the Cabinet members yesterday discussed the Irish question, including reprisal, with General MacCready, Commander-in-Chief of British military forces in Ireland, and Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland. A complete agreement was reached over the Government's policy.

Martinsfield, Ohio, Oct. 1st.—Five thousand bituminous coal miners in Ohio have voted to go on strike. Five thousand miners in Western Kentucky resumed work today.

Washington, Oct. 1st.—Costa Rica has applied for membership in the League of Nations. Thirty-nine members of the League were present and expect to give early consideration to applications for membership. Thirteen nations have applied and their applications will be considered at the first meeting of the League, which will assemble on November 15th.

Rome, Oct. 1st.—Anxiety over the internal situation in Italy has passed. King Victor Emmanuel is planning a hunting trip. Premier Giolitti intends taking a week's vacation.

Tallahassee, Florida, Oct. 1st.—Proceedings have been instituted in the Florida Supreme Court by the Attorney General against forty cigar manufacturing firms charged with entering into a conspiracy with members of the cigar manufacturers association of Tampa, and operating in restraint of trade, in violation of the state law.

Wilmington, N. C., Oct. 1st.—The tug Blanche is searching for seven barges lost during the storm off Charleston lightship. These barges were purchased by a Cuban concern for lighter-sugar.

Mobile, Ala., Oct. 1st.—The schooner Three Marys, en route from Mobile to Havana, has been abandoned near Mobile. The steamer Lake Forest has rescued the crew. It is hoped that the schooner's cargo of lumber worth \$75,000 can be salvaged.

New Orleans, Oct. 3rd.—Associated Press. Twelve members of the crew of the passenger steamer Speedwell lost on the west side of the Gulf of Mexico in the recent storm, have been picked up by lifeboats of the steamship Lake Superior.

Paris, Oct. 1st.—Associated Press. Cardinal Dubois has been appointed Archbishop of Paris, succeeding Cardinal Amette.
