headed a party of twenty, including his wife and their daughter Megan, which left this morning for Genoa. The continued illness of Lord Curzon, who is suffering from neuritis, has caused the postponement of his departure until next week, but Sir Laming Worthington Evans and Sir Robert Horne accompanied the Premier, others in the party including Sir Maurice Hankey, Secretary to the Delegation and Sir Philip Sassoon. The journey to Paris will be unbroken and after a short delay in the French capital, during which Mr. Lloyd George will confer with M. Poincare, the party will pro-

ceed directly to Italy. The remainder of the British experts and secretaries will leave London tomorrow.

Ottawa, April 7th.—The President of the United States, who is himself a Kiwanian, yesterday wired the following message to the Secretary of the Kiwanian Club at this city, in connection with the celebration by the Ottawa Club of the United States-Canada week. "Please convey to the assembled Kiwanian my very cordial greetings and assure them that I join them in rejoicing over the surpassingly good results which have attended the Rush-Bagot agreement of 1818 and which enabled the United States and Canada to give an example to the world of neighbourly relationship in more than a century of peace and freedom from the burdens of armed watchfulness. I trust all the centuries will be marked by the same cordial neighbourliness which has been the signal feature of the new world progress in which we share with pride".

London, April 7th.—The five per cent war loan, the largest loan raised by the Government during the war, reached par, one hundred, today and for the first time attained a premium of five per cent over the price of issue. According to the "Times", the advance occurred after the Stock Exchange had closed and was a result of the favourable terms on which the Treasury sold by tender sixty million pounds of treasury bills, at an average discount rate of five shillings below last weeks rate, the lowest rate since the re introduction of the tender system.

Paris, April 7th.—The British and French delegations to the Genoa Conference are going to work together with the determination to make that gathering, which opens on Monday, a success. Mr. Lloyd George said tonight after an hour's conversation with M. Poincare, which took place in the formers sleeping saloon while the train was waiting at the Gare Du Nord to be shunted on to the Mediterranean line. The British Premier appeared in the best of humour after this informal interview, which was also participated in by M. Barthou, who will head the French delegation. Mr. Lloyd George said he was gratified over the prospects of something definite for the reconstruction of Europe coming out of the Genoa meeting.

London, April 8th.—The death occurred at Oxford yesterday, at the age of 87, of Professor Venn Dicey, who was a veteran professor of English Law at Oxford University for twenty seven years. He was one of the greatest authorities on the British constitution.

New York, April 7th.—General Sem-noll denied today before the referee in bankruptcy that he had ever seized property belonging to the Yourevata Home and Foreign Trading Company, a bankrupt New York concern which caused his arrest here on Thursday night. He said that if the company ever lost any supplies through cossack raids, he knew

nothing of it himself, because, while he was commanding officer, he could not be held directly responsible for what his men did. Immediately after he had made his statement, the hearing was adjourned until tomorrow, when he will be examined in full on the charges against him.

London, April 8th.—The recent fatal collision, between express aeroplanes, seventy miles from Paris, is said to have been the first of its kind on the commercial air route between England and France for a British machine. It was the first trip, under new management, of a company which inaugurated the service last month, the capacity of the machine being for eight passengers and five hundred pounds of baggage. Duke, the pilot, had a splendid war flying record and had for a long time been engaged in commercial aviation. He was a Lieutenant in the Royal Air Force and was also a music composer of some repute. It was said at the Air Ministry last week that possibly the two machines came into collision in consequence of having been caught in an air current.

Genoa, April 8th.—The Government has requisitioned all the available accommodation in the city for lodging the fifteen hundred persons comprising the various delegations to the Conference. The newspaper correspondents number eight hundred. Order will be maintained in the city during the Conference by a guard of five thousand soldiers.

Paris, April 8th.—The Ministry for Foreign Affairs has received an official acceptance by the Angora Government of the Armistice proposals, on the condition of the vacuation of Smyrna. Advices from Smyrna however state that General Parpoulas, who received an ovation and was carried in triumph through the streets, accepted the ovation as a mark of confidence in the Greek army and assured the manifestants that Greece would never abandon the population of Asia Minor.

San Francisco, April 8th.—Field Marshal Joffre, on his arrival here, was received with enthusiasm, the city being profusely decorated with flags. The Mayor of the city and a group of other officials met the Field Marshal and his wife and daughter and escorted them to the city. The programme of entertainment included a great parade a reception by the Municipality and the women of San Francisco and a banquet.

Brussels, April 8th.—Belgian Commercial economic mission will leave shortly for Japan, to establish markets for the exportation and purchase of raw materials and manufactured products actually purchased in the markets of South America.

Paris, April 9th.—The Chamber of Deputies has adjourned until the twenty third May, after an all night sitting last night. Upon reassembling, its first discussions will be on the new military service law.
