TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Centralia, Washington, Nov. 12th.—State troops today patrolled this city, where during an armistice day celebration yesterday, four members of the American Legion were shot at and killed and five others wounded by men said to be members of the Industrial Workers of the World and Britt Smith, Secretary of the local branch of the Industrial Workers was hanged by a mob. The reason for the attack, which came as the head of the parade swung past the I. W. W. headquarters, has not been developed fully, but Mr. Herbert Allen, an attorney and member of a committee of former servicemen and others, cooperating with the authorities in an investigation, said evidence had been premeditated. Citizens today planned to drive all Radicals from Centralia, where they have been increasing for some time. Centralia was the headquarters for the Lewis Country Industrial Workers, operating from here into the Logging camps, and other Industrial pursuits of this section. American Legion members expressed determination that every I. W. W. man must leave the city.

Seattle, Nov. 12th.—"War to the death is now on against the I. W. W. Mr. Robert Saunders, U. S. district Attorney, declared here today, no further evidence than the Centralia murders is needed, he asserted, to prosecute all I. W. W. to the full extent of the law. Seattle police today raided the I. W. W. headquarters here, arrested three men, and seized what they described as "A Tom of Literature."

Centralia, Washington Nov. 12th.—Nineteen alleged Industrial Workers of the World are in jail here today. The men were rounded up yesterday and last night after the firing on the armistice day parade, which resulted in the death of four members of the American Legion, and the lynching of an I. W. W. member. There was no disorder here this morning.

Oakland, Cal., Nov. 12th.—A crowd of citizens entered the headquarters of the communist labour party in Loring Hall early today and wrecked the interior of the place. Large quantities of Radical literature, red flags and furniture were burned in the streets by the mob.

Halifax, Nov. 13th.—H. M. S. Danae arrived in port yesterday from Great Britain, and will await the arrival of H. M. S. Renown here. The Danae is of the same class as the Dauntless and Dragon which accompanied the Renown here

when she brought H. R. H. the Prince of Wales to Canada.

Washington, Nov. 12th.—The Prince of Wales started the second day of his stay in Washington with a visit to the National headquarters of the American Red Cross, where the national and district leaders were presented to him. Afterwards he inspected the Lincoln memorial and visited the Walter Reid hospital where he met a number of soldiers who were wounded overseas.

Victoria, Nov. 12th.—The battle cruiser New Zealand with Admiral Jellicoe and his staff left Esquimalt harbour today and will proceed to Vancouver. So far as could be learned the plans of Admiral Jellicoe immediately upon his arrival on the mainland are uncertain. It is understood that he and members of his staff will go to Duncan Bay, and then go through the Seymour Narrows on one of the Federal Government patrol boats for the purpose of inspecting suggested sites for naval bases. Shortly after the arrival of the New Zealand in Esquimalt, Admiral Jellicoe despatched one of his officers to Port Alberni where an investigation has been conducted into the feasibility of the Alberni Canal as a base. According to present arrangements Admiral Jellicoe leaves Vancouver on Nov. 19th. for Ottawa.

New York, Nov. 12th.—The cruiser Renown which is to carry the Prince of Wales home after his visit to the United States, arrived here today from Port-of-Spain, Trinidad. The Prince will live on the Renown while in New York.

London, Nov. 12th.—Major Genl. Seeley, whose resignation as head of the Air Ministry was announced yesterday, took his seat on the opposition bench in the House of Commons today. Genl. Seeley explained that he had resigned his post because of dissatisfaction over the Dual control of the Air Force, which he said, had arisen.

Washington, Nov. 13th.—A movement to limit the Senate debate on the peace treaty by invoking the closure rule, was inaugurated today by democratic leaders. A petition for closure requiring but sixteen signatures for submission, was circulated by the administration leaders and soon had double the necessary number.

Washington, Nov. 13th. Activities of Radicals threaten serious trouble in the bituminous coal fields of West Virginia, according to reports received today, by the Department of Justice. The situation in Monongahela and Taylor is described by the Dept. of Justice as "particularly navy", meetings directed and attended largely by Russians, have precipitated some violence among the coal miners, the reports said.
