Paris, Sept. 22nd.—France will pay every dollar of the \$250,000,000 loan due in New York October 15th, M. Francois Marshal the Minister of Finance officially announced to the Cabinet Council today. This sum is France's share of the \$5,000,000,000 Anglo-French loan floated in the United States during the war.

Paris, Sept. 22nd.—M. Clemenceau left Paris last evening for Marseilles where he will embark for India. The former Premier will spend several weeks hunting in the Himalayas.

London, Sept. 22nd.—The authorities here are taking precautions against bomb outrages similar to those at New York and Genoa. The Stock Exchange yesterday issued a notice that parcels must not be delivered at the Exchange but deposited at a nearby cloakroom. One of the Exchange exits also has been closed.

New Bedford, Mass, Sept. 22nd.—An anonymous warning that bomb outrages involving the City Hall in this city and Fall river are planned for Thursday has been received by the Mayor. The warning was contained in a communication which said that simultaneous attacks would be made on the City Halls' banks and mills in each city: Police officers have been notified.

Vancouver, Sept. 22nd.—According to reports reaching here it is estimated that nearly one million dollars damage has been caused to the oat crop by the heavy rains of the past week on the lower mainland.

London, Sept. 22nd.—The Earl of Lytton has been appointed Under-Secretary for India. He succeeds Lord Sinha who has resigned.

Tokio, Sept. 22nd.—Fifteen hundred new cases of cholera have been discovered in Korea, according to an official statement issued at Seoul. This makes the total number of victims of the disease more than 20,000 of which more than 9,000 cases have died.

Paris, Sept. 22nd.—Mr. Marsal replying to a question submitted to him by a member of the Senate said today that the expenses incurred through the Rhine occupation were estimated at the end of March to have reached 18,000,000,000 francs. The amount paid by Germany on account was 13,088,000,000 marks by the end of July.

We see from the latest Danish papers, that the new Grain-Laws in Denmark, for 1920 to 1921, leave no doubt as to the prior rights of the State, or population, to the products of the country.

All winter-grain (wheat and rye) is being taken over by the state, while the exportation of spring-grain (barley and oats) is prohibited.

The Minister of Agriculture has the right to export, for account of the Danish State, such quantities of the winter-grain as in his judgment can be spared (which shows that the State does not alone commandeer what is necessary for the population, but the whole crop) while he is authorized to grant permits to export spring-grain on certain conditions, and against an export-tax of 60 per cent of the profit obtained by the exportation.
