ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 26th.—Mr. Lloyd George in the House of Commons today confirmed reports that the Russian Soviet Govt. sent a note accepting Great Britain's proposal for a peace conference in Lon-

don between the Soviet and the Powers engaged in hostile action against the Soviet, or supporting such action. Mr. Lloyd George said that the Soviet had also suggested that representatives of the leading powers attend the conference. The Premier added that Great Britain was conferring with her allies on the subject. The Premier replying to questions concerning Russia, said:—"I am very hopeful of peace, and that is what the world anticipates." He also stated the since the Russian Govt. had agreed to the Polish armistice, Great Britain had withdrawn her objection to the Soviet delegation proceeding to London. The peace conference between the Russians and Poles will begin at Baranovitch, 85 miles southwest of Minsk on July 20th. and the armistice will start the same day. The Lloyd George boundary-line will hold in the north, and the actual military line in the south on July 30th. will be observed. A wireless message from Moscow today asks the Polish Peace Plenipotentiaries to cross the lines along the Baranovitch-Brest-Litovsk highway on July 30th. where they will be met. The message however does not fix the exact location of the armistice meeting. The Bolsheviki troops have occupied a number of villages on the right bank of the river Zoruez, according to a communique issued at Moscow yesterday, and received here today". In the Volotchisk region our troops forded the river Zbrucz northward of Volotchisk. During the fighting we occupied a number of villages on the right bank of the river. In the direction of Grodno our advance south of the river Niemen continues satisfactorily.
