### LOCAL.

The Creole arrived here this morning from St. Thomas with local mails.

Sunday at three p. m. in the Gospel Tabernacle the ordination service of Charles Stanley Mayhew was conducted after the following program:

The opening hymn was "Onward Christian soldiers."

Rev. George W. Critchlow offered the opening prayer and Mr. Christian Jacobs read the first scripture lesson from Jeremiah 1: 1-19.

Then followed the hymn "Stand up, stand up for Jesus, ye soldiers of the cross:" and the second scripture lesson was read by the Rev. Critchlow, from 1 Timothy 3: 1-16 and "See the fight is on in its power today" was sung.

The ordination sermon was preached by Rev. John R. Mayhew, field superintendent of the Mission work and only brother to the candidate for ordination: Mr. Mayhew's theme being "A good minister of Jesus Christ," the text found in 1 Timothy 4: 6. The leading points he gave in sermon were:—

1. Chosen of God.
2. Whom God chooses He calls.
3. Whom He calls He qualifies.
4. Some characteristics of a good

minister.

5. How the church should regard God's minister.

After the sermon the congregation again sang, "Savour, 'tis a full surrender".

Then the Candidate standing, while Supt. Mayhew read to him from 1 Tim. 3:1-7 then followed the solemn admonition and questions, to which the candidate replied; afterward kneeling, while the ministers present gathered round him with the laying on of hands: after which the candidate was given a Bible by the Supt. saying, "Take thou authority to preach the word of God, and to administer the holy sacraments in the congregation," then read 2 Tim. 4:1-5 and the right hand of fellowship was extended by the ministers.

"A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify", was then sung and a short address, "Charge given to the Church" was delivered by Rev. Belle B. Burns.

The Doxology followed, after which Rev. C. S. Mayhew pronounced the benediction.

The house was well filled and excellent attention was given, this interesting service.

### TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Baltimore, March 3rd. — President

Harding today definitely announced the selection of I. Davis of Pittsburg to be Secretary of Labour and of G. G. Christian jr., to be Secretary to the President.

Washington, March 3rd.—Mr. Wilson formally announced today that he would resume the practice of law in partnership with Mr. Bainbridge Colby, the retiring Secretary of State. The firm will maintain office in New York and Washington.

Washington, March 4th.—Efforts to overrule the President's vote of the Fordney Tariff Bill failed in the House early this morning and the measure originally designed to aid the farmers, thereby met its death. The vote on the motion to pass the measure over the President's vote, was 201 for and 132 against.

New York, March 4th.—The New York World this morning gives President Wilson a warm send off after eight years of administrative service at Washington by publishing messages of praise from eminent statesmen of affairs in all parts of the world including Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Japan, Brazil, and Spain. The comment of political German is particularly bitter. Prince Max of Baden says President Wilson has played false to his own ideal. The cry of those who once loved Wilson must be "Long live the cause he betrayed". Count Von Bernstorff, ex-German Ambassador at Washington, says he is the last man in the world to write about Wilson but thank the newspaper for the request.

Berlin, March 4th.—The German Communist Party made the ultimatum delivered by the Allies to the German delegation in London on the occasion for a revolutionary proclamation in which the German working men are called on to overthrow the Govt., erect a Soviet State and effect a political and economical alliance with Russia. The Communist announced that demonstrations will be held on Sunday. The German newspapers in their comment on the Allied ultimatum to Germany on reparations are unanimous in demanding that the Govt. oppose the ultimatum with a "determined no". The "Tageblatt" says it sees no purpose in waiting until Monday, as the amount demanded in the proposals is wholly out of the question. A smaller question is very often more advantageous than a huge one, especially if the latter is somewhere on paper or somewhere up in the clouds the Liberal Organ adds: Boersen Zeitung is of the opinion that the decision now rests with the Govt. and the Reichstag assuming that the situation in London precludes fresh negotiations.

Paris, March 4th. Messages have been sent by the League of Nations Council to Panama and Costa Rica calling their attention to the fact that the two Republics are members of the League of Nations.
