Dempsey wins by knock out in fourth round. Gong rang. Round one is off. Carpentier was the first to lead, pushing a lightning left to Dempsey's face. Quickly the Frenchman tried a right hand swing to Dempsey's face at close quarters, drove in a hard body punch. They went to the ropes. Jack tried a left hand swing to the back of the head. Carpentier was not afraid to fight. He steps with right to head but Jack kept hammering the body with left hand. Dempsey blocked a right and landed a body blow. They were clinched, he jumped back however, and ran into a mix in which he held his own till the bell.

2nd. round. Before Dempsey could lead, Carpentier tried a right which missed the head by several inches. Again he attempted to put this blow over and reached the neck, Dempsey seemed to lack the speed that made him beat Willard, and sparred for several moments as if wondering how to attack. The Frenchman used feet and battled away looking Dempsey over with a puzzled expression. A right hander raised a lump on Dempsey left eye, and quick as a flash Carpentier drove home a right to the chin that made Dempsey stagger to the ropes. It was a terrific punch, and only Dempsey's wonderful endurance saved him from a knock-out. Carpentier with a quick attack made Dempsey reel. He was in distress for a few minutes. Dempsey was very slow during the last two seconds, either because Carpentier's blows had hurt, or his condition was not as good as had been reported. At any rate, Carpentier had this round, and his

stock took a big boom. The world champion looked amazed and stunned when he sat down.

Round three. Carpentier had his left eye cut open when he came up and boxed at long range for a moment. Dempsey clumsily tried to box, Carpentier caught him under the ear, which brought a clinch, stepping clear, Georges tried two vicious right hand upper cuts, which raised the point of the jaw, once more Carpentier let his left fly, only to miss by a hairline. Dempsey confined his efforts in blocking. The Frenchman finally stepped away to escape punishment around the belt. Then stepping back Carpentier put left for the neck. Carpentier put Jack to the rope and trounced him to the stomach until Jack clinched. Dempsey towards the end of the third, began to fight with great vigour and Carpentier held at the bell. It was Carpentier round.

Round four. Carpentier began to employ foot work as soon as he got up, but Jack followed him closely, and started to slug. He made Georges clinch with body blows and hooks on the chin. Jack missed a right to the jaw, and Carpentier knocked it with both landing, Dempsey broke out a clinch and followed his man closely and suddenly swung a lightning right hander under the jaw. Carpentier droppee on his side dazed and bewildered. He wriggled around the floor as if his legs and arms had been broken. Referee stood over him and counted the seconds slowly and deliberately. At the count of nine Carpentier staggered to his feet wild eyed and weak. He looked around for Dempsey and raised his hand. Dempsey bounded forward and drove a second right to the Frenchman's heart. This blow settled the fight.

Dempsey proved himself the reatest fighter in the world this afternoon when he knocked out Georges Carpentier, the idol of France in the fourth round. A vigorous right to the jaw ended the bout and brought the fight to a climax when it looked as if it might go on for many more rounds. After one minute of the fourth rounds Dempsey crashed his right to Carpentier's jaw, and the Frenchman went down in a wild-eyed despatches looking at him from his corner in absolute terror. Dempsey stood a space away from the prostrated Frenchman, with his right hand ready to finish the task. Carpentier arose with an effort. He had hardly straightened himself when Dempsey crashed his right to his heart after one minute and sixteen seconds. The Frenchman fell to the floor with a thud that rocked the rigg. He was obviously out, the count was unnecessary. Dempsey stood over him again, apparently unwilling to be fooled by a gong like he was in Toledo two years ago. He seemed to snap out deep thought when Jack Kearns rushed and threw his arm around him. Kearns tried to put the champion to his corner but he pushed him aside leaned over and picked up Carpentier, holding him in his arms until the frantic Deschamps climbed through the ropes and dragged the Frenchman to his corner. Carpentier was out for fully three minutes. Even when he left the ring nearly ten minutes later he could not hold himself erect. He smiled when Dempsey approached him and shook hands with his left glove over the Frenchman's shoulder. "Carpentier is a fine boy and gave me a tough fight. I am going home as soon as I can," he said to the press box. Dempsey won the fight with his terrific body punch. He found out in the first round that he could take the vaunted right hand punch of the Frenchman and he waded in, fighting a typical Dempsey fight and pounding the Frenchman without regarding his defence. Dempsey's punches were quite obviously wearing down the Frenchman. After the first round Carpentier recovered and came back in the second to fight a running battle. In the middle of the second round he got a staggering right flash to Dempsey's jaw. He rocked the champion against the ropes and the crowd yelled like maniacs when Carpentier followed his advantage with rights and lefts to Dempsey's jaw, the Frenchman

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
