St. Thomas News

In response to the invitation given on Tuesday, a representative gathering assembled at the Lutheran Church last evening to celebrate the anniversary of the Reformation.

The pastor Rev. J. C. Christensen opened the service with a short devotional exercise, told the object of the meeting, and called on Rt. Rev. Bishop Greider, who gave a short account of the Church in the 15th century, prior to the Reformation, which led to its awakening. He was followed by Rev. Folensbee who spoke of the stand which the Reformers took and the tenets upheld by them especially the free use of the Holy Scriptures, the justification by faith. The last speaker, Rev. Romig, wound up by showing the good and great work which the early Reformers have done, and which is being continued by the various Protestant Churches in the Evangelization of the world.

Besides the singing of Sacred Songs

relative to the Church, the choir rendered an Anthem, and the meeting was closed by the pronouncing of the benediction by Bishop Greider.—*Ibid.*
