TELEGRAM.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Constantinople, March 30th.—Greek naval forces, it was learned today are watching the Black Sea for Turkish transport in an effort to prevent the escape from Constantinople to Anatolia of Turkish officers and soldiers who, in view of the neutrality of the Allies in the hostilities between the Greek and the Turkish Nationalists, had petitioned the Allied Authorities for permission to leave. In withdrawing before the Greek advance in Asia Minor, the Turks are blowing up the important bridge and tunnels on the Bagdad railway, along their line of retreat. This is aggravating the transportation difficulties of the Greeks, which is predicted by Isham Pasha, a prominent Turkish Cavalry General, will be the cause of ultimate failure of the Greek campaign.

Geneva, March 29th.—The League of Nations has received a second protest from Germany calling attention to the continued occupancy by Allied troops of Germany. The note expresses the hope that articles 12 and 17 of the Peace Pact will be applied according to the preceding note of March 10th.

Baltimore, March 29th.—Crowds besieged the gates of the cathedral today from shortly after nine o'clock in the morning, until 8.30 o'clock at night in their desire to get into the edifice to view the body of Cardinal Gibbons. It is estimated that between 25,000 and 30,000 persons filed past the catafalque between eleven and eight p. m.

Berlin, March 29th.—The Government believes it had effectually broken up the insurgent communist rising in the mid-German industrial areas with the capture of the main body of rioters at Leuna and Ammentdorf. Thus far 1,300 communists have been arrested and the others are reported either to be fleeing, leaving their arms behind, or surrendering. President Ebert had authorized the installation of extraordinary emergency courts for the speedy trial of communist rioters. Reports arriving in Berlin up to three o'clock this afternoon from mid-Germany and Ruhr points indicate that the communist had been unsuccessful in their attempt to provoke widespread general strikes. Only unimportant walk-outs were reported from isolated districts. The big shops in greater Berlin were operating this afternoon with full complements of workers although communists invaded several plants this morning and attempted to persuade the workers to quit. The city is being patrolled actively by security police and all outdoor gatherings have been prohibited.

Washington, March 30th.—The resignation of Mr. Roland S. Morris as United States ambassador to Japan, was accepted yesterday by President Harding according to an announcement by the State Dept.

Paris, March 30th.—A London despatch to the "Petit Parisien" says that Mr. Lloyd George, Sir Laming Worthington-Evans and Field Marshal Wilson held a conference last evening. The despatch asserts that it is believed in London that the question discussed at the conference was the extension of military penalties upon Germany as a result of her refusal to pay the 12,000,000,000 marks in reparations before May 1st, as demanded by the Reparations Commission.

London, March 30th.—The nations revenue for the financial year, which ends with the present month, may fall short of the Chancellors estimate by a few millions. There will be a surplus of income over expenditure of more than £200,000,000. About £100,000,000 of this credit balance has been obtained by economy in the water supply services. The estimated expenditure on these services for the whole year was £89,970,000, and up to March 26th. The actual cost was £7,128,000. The chief falling off in revenue is from the sale of war stores. So far these sales have yielded £264,059,048, and apparently the total on March 31st will be £30,000,000, less than the estimate. The floating debt has been reduced by £41,082,003, and now stands at £1,101,709,000.
