TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Barbados, May 22nd.—A special meeting of the Barbados Chamber of Commerce was held at 11 a. m. on Saturday last for the purpose of considering a telegram from the Canadian West Indian League on the question of the preference on sugar. The President explaining the object of the meeting, read the following telegram received from the League: "Chamber of Commerce Barbados. The new Canadian tariff repeals dumping clauses on sugar alone. Will inevitably result considerable imports United States refined made from foreign raws thereby seriously affecting your Canadian market. Consider this is departure from spirit if not letter of trade agreement. Arrange protest failing immediate action by your Government cable your protest direct to Finance Minister Ottawa. Quick action necessary." After the matter had been fully discussed, it was decided by the Chamber to send the following telegram direct to the Finance Minister at Ottawa: Barbados Agricultural Society and Chamber of Commerce view with grave concern proposed repeal dumping clause Canadian tariff relative sugar. Consider such contrary trade agreement seriously affect preference and very detrimental West Indian industry. Respectfully urge withdrawal proposed repeal." It was further agreed to send a copy of the above telegram to the Trinidad Chamber of Commerce and the West India Committee with the information that they approved of a protest being sent through the Associated Chambers of Commerce. A deputation waited on His Excellency at 1 o'clock on Saturday last and put the matter before him to be laid by cable before the Secretary of State for the Colonies at the earliest opportunity.

London, May 22nd.—Mr. Stanley Baldwin is Great Britain's new premier. He accepted the premiership offered him this afternoon by the King. The Central News says the leaders of the Conservative party elected Mr. Baldwin as Premier, that he accepted and that Sir Robert Horne, former Chancellor of the Exchequer, has agreed to succeed Mr. Baldwin in that office.

Lisbon, May 21st.—Six persons were killed and 30 injured in an accident to a descending train on the Cogwheel railway on Mount Bon Jesus, near Braga today. The majority of the victims were holiday makers from Opporto.

Madrid, May 21st.—The "Golden

Rose" sent by the Pope to Queen Victoria of Spain was presented to her Majesty yesterday by Monsignor Tedeschini, the Papal Nuncio, in the presence of the Cabinet Ministers and members of the Diplomatic Corps. The token was sent in revival of the ancient custom of honoring the Queen who during the year has performed the most pious deeds for the church.

St. Johns, N. F., May 21st.—The steamer Maravale, of the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company struck a reef off the south coast of New Foundland late this afternoon and is a complete wreck. All the passengers and crew of the ship were safely landed. Only meagre details are available of the wreck, which occurred during one of the dense fogs that have blanketed this portion of the coast for the last week or so. The ship struck on Cape Freels rock, at half past four this afternoon. Her engines were immediately reversed and she backed off. She was making water so rapidly that the boats were ordered away at once. The work of debarkation went on rapidly and was finished none too soon, for an hour later the big ship was lying on the bottom in seven fathoms of water, with only her boat deck showing above the surface. The rock lies about one mile off the land and the nature of the injuries sustained by the ship can be gathered from the fact that she sank before the captain could complete his effort to beach her.

Trepassey, Newfoundland, May 21st.—The passengers and crew of the Canadian Pacific liner Maravale which was wrecked after striking Cape Freels rock near here late today, were safely landed tonight at the village of St Shotts. All of the 436 persons on board were saved.

Geneva, May 21st.—The Swiss Government's note in reply to the protest concerning the assassination at Lausanne of Vorovsky the Soviet Envoy, declares that Switzerland has a better right to demand explanations for the violence suffered by thousands of Swiss in Russia under the Soviet regime, than to give them regarding the death of one Russian who was unofficial and unwelcome visitor. The reply, which was entirely drafted by M. Motta, chief of the police department, has to be approved by the Federal Council. In regard to charges that Vorovsky was not sufficiently protected, the reply asserts that the Swiss police cannot give special supervision for the protection of every visitor to the country. It concludes that the trial of Maurice Conradi, who shot Vorovsky, will be held in due Swiss legal form and that foreign interference will not be tolerated.

Essen, May 21st.—Seven coal mines in the Portmund district have been compelled to shut down because of the communist agitation for higher wages. It is estimated that 32,000 miners are striking and that 10,000 others are be
