EDITORIAL.

We have information that there will be no trial by jury at the forthcoming opening session of the District Court advertised for the 18th and 20th instant at Frederiksted and this town respectively, as erroneously promulgated in a printed statement by which people have been misled; and upon proper authority it is made known that jury trials will not be held for the reason that the newly adopted code provides that the jury panel shall be drawn by a commission composed of a member appointed by the Governor, one by the Colonial Council and one ex officio, namely the clerk of the court, and neither the Governor nor the Colonial Council has acted

in this matter. It is advised that rather than delay the opening of the court, His Honor Judge Malmin has decided it would be best to proceed without a jury at the October term. Those who have been led into mistakenly believing that a jury will sit and act will be informed accordingly.

LOCAL.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Panama, Oct. 3rd.—The September Canal tolls totalled \$1,000,000, the highest month on record.

Dunbury, Conn., Oct. 4th.—Speaking here last night, Senator Borah, Republican irreconcilable, opposed Senator Harding's proposal that America enter an association of nations as a substitute for the League of Nations.

Warsaw, Oct. 3rd.—President Palsudski is personally conducting the Polish drive against the Bolsheviks on the Northern front. Sixteen Bolshevik divisions have been completely defeated by the Poles, who have captured the staffs of two armies, several divisions and brigades and 42,000 prisoners. Immense stores of munitions and supplies are being assembled for a full Bolshevik campaign against Poland.

London, Oct. 3rd.—Stockholm despatches report that the Bolsheviks are in full retreat on the Polish and Crimean fronts, that the Bolshevik troops are hungry and demoralized, and deserting and surrendering in large numbers. The Soviets are worried over Trotsky's failure to secure recruits in Siberia Eastern Province. Peasants and workmen refuse to enlist.

Washington, Oct. 4th.—Official despatches forecast the failure of the Polish-Bolshevik peace negotiations at Riga. The continuing military success of the Poles, and of General Wrangel, Anti-Bolshevik leader in South Russia, are influencing the Poles not to make peace at this time.

Constantinople, Oct. 4th.—The forces of General Wrangel in the Novokiyobaska region captured 5,000 Bolshevik prisoners, 900 cannon and other munitions. Wrangel's forces also captured 3,000 prisoners, many machine-guns and cannon in the vicinity of Finelnikovo.

Berne, Ottzerland, Oct. 4th.—Italy and Jugo-Slavia are soon to open direct negotiations in an effort to reach a definite settlement of the Adriatic question.

Riga, Oct. 5th.—The Bolshevik and Polish delegations to the peace conference have agreed to sign a preliminary armistice not later than October 8th. They refused to disclose the terms. Dur-
