The Tadousac will make a recreation and health trip for the officials of St. Croix and their families next week. The itinerary of the Tadousac is to sail from Christiansted to San Juan on 21st, spend two days in San Juan, and return to Frederiksted on the 24th—The St. Thomas Times, Nov. 18th.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

London, Nov. 15th.—Lady Cooper, whose husband, Sir Richard Cooper, retired to make way for her, and who had made a strong campaign as a Conservative, was defeated in Walsall. Lady Emmott, Asquithian Liberal, was at the bottom of the poll in Oldham. The Georgian, Sir E. Gibb, headed the list, polling 24,747. The Labourite was second, with 24,434 capturing the seat from the Conservative by a few hundred votes. Lady Emmott's vote was 6,186. Mr. Derwent Hall Cain, the novelist's son and labour candidate, was defeated in Reading. The Conservative candidate, Major Cadogan retaining the seat. Mr.

Ben Tillet, Labourite, retains his seat in the North division of Salford by a narrow margin, polling 21,368 against the Conservative opponents 21,348. Miss Eleanor Rathbone, Independent, was defeated for the East Toxteth division of Liverpool polling 9,981 against 13,149 for the Conservative, Captain Ranking.

London, Nov. 15th.—Mr. Asquith was re-elected in Paisley, but his majority was greatly reduced. He received 15,000 votes and his labour opponent, Mr. Biggar 14,689.

Constantinople, Nov. 15th.—The Turkish Nationalist Government has given formal assurances to the Allies that the stipulations of the Mudania armistice agreement will be respected.

Berlin, Nov. 15th.—It is semi-officially stated that the resignation of the Government will not affect the reparations programme, as expounded in yesterday's note. This, it is declared, will be maintained by any future Government.

Paris, Nov. 15th.—Germany today turned over the second instalment of notes to meet Belgium's reparations claims under the decision of August 21st last. German reparations officials here deposited with the reparations commission 55,000,000 gold marks, the worth of such notes being payable in Brussels on May 15th 1923. The cash balance due today, under the schedule of payments previously decided upon, was 60,000,000 gold marks. The difference of 5,000,000 marks is that the 5,000,000 is partially covered by other receipts in the hands of the commission and Germany has announced that she will deliver on Friday, such additional notes, as are necessary to cover the balance due.

London, Nov. 15th.—Mr. Rudyard Kipling successfully underwent an operation this morning.

Berlin, Nov. 15th.—The report that the French Government was demanding of Germany 50,000 tons of potash on reparations account was confirmed today by the potash syndicate. The syndicate representatives added that the negotiations for the potash had been virtually completed.

Dublin, Nov. 15th.—Cardinal Logue, Primate of Ireland, suggests the release of Mary MacSweeney from the Mountjoy prison, where she has been on a hunger strike for 11 days. His suggestion was contained in a telegram to Mr. O'Higgins, Free State Minister of Home Affairs. The message said that more harm would be caused by delaying the release of the woman prisoners in Ireland than by liberating them.

Washington, November 14th.—Receipt of \$50,610,000 for account of the United States Government, was reported today to the Treasury by the Federal reserve bank of New York. Of the total, \$50,000,000 represents interest on the war debt of Great Britain to the United States and \$60,000, represents interests on the debt representing the sale of silver to
