PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from yesterday's Avis.)

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. The protest was handed to me by a number of tax-payers in this island (the Member read the protest) and continuing said,—The proponent of the bill claims that they do not have any representation in this Council, but I claim they have, and I claim that we are here to represent them. There were about ten town people also who signed this protest they did it by way of supporting me; I have no support here in the Council. The idea of forcing bonds on the people is unfair; the production of the island is falling off, we haven't sufficient laborers, and the few we have are not giving satisfaction. I am standing here legislating for the benefit of the community, and when it comes to one man running the whole island and freezing out every body else, I will not stand for it; it is unfair. I know many of the tax-payers are against this proposal, and I do not blame them. All I know about a concrete road is what I have been told by others who claim to have some knowledge about it. I am told by men with experience that you cannot drive a barefooted or smooth shod animal on a concrete road. To drive on a concrete road their shoes must have steel corks on them. Do you think the low cart man and the squatter will be able to stand such expense? I do not think they would. I would be very glad to see this island keep out of a \$100,000 bond debt.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I do not think any one will see in the record of the last meeting such a statement as the last speaker has made, that is, the taxpayers have no representation in this Council.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood): This is a question the tax-payers are against.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I must confess that I do not understand the amendment introduced by 4th Appointed Member. Is Section 2 of his amendment to replace Section 2 of the original?

Member Blackwood answered: To replace Section 2 of the original?

Member Canegata: Is your amendment to be taken as a whole?

Member Blackwood: As a whole.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I propose that the amendment be put to the vote and unless Honorable Members of this Council desire to see the sugar industry ruined, I recommend that the amendment be voted down.

The Chairman remarked: Amendments to a bill, according to the Rules of Business, are to be discussed separately and voted upon separately. 1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) has made a motion that the amendment be put to the vote, I do not consider it my duty to do so now; the Honorable Member should have a chance to speak on his amendment. I will take up Section 1 and after discussion is had upon it I will put it to the vote. I took the pains to have that part of the Rules of Business relating to this particular procedure typewritten and circulated among members, from that you will see that the bill is to be put to the vote as amended.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman. Why I ask the question is because I find the way the amendment is being discussed, it is discussed as an amendment to the whole bill.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. After reading the sections of the amendment if the Council desires to use it as a new bill, it would make no difference with me. The support I am getting from outside should count with the Government if not with the Council.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I would like to ask if every squatter or every man who owns a ten acres of land, would, according to this amendment, have to pay a tax of Frs. 50? What about the man who raises vegetables and cattle? The Honorable 4th Appointed Member spoke about class legislation some time ago. This certainly is class legislation.

1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) remarked: Mr. Chairman. We are going outside of the matter which is before us. This is an amendment to the bill, and we should save time by putting the amendment to the vote.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. In reply to 2nd Member (Canegata) I wish to ask why a squatter should not pay a produce tax? I spoke to a squatter the other day, a fairly intelligent man he seems to be he told me that some of the roads are in bad condition and whenever his cart goes into a deep hole it is pretty hard to come out; he said he was very much interested about the roads, and asked me what the prospects of getting a
