St. Lucia, 2.30 p.m. Barometer 29.76, N.E., squally, heavy rains.

Trinidad, 2.30 p.m. Barometer corrected reading 29.725, wind strong and variable, now S.W., heavy rain.

Barbados, 5 p.m.,—S.S. Guiana and Canadian Beaver put out to sea this morning, not yet returned. Wind S.E., strong and gusty. Bar. 29.77, Steady.

Halifax, N.S., Sept. 4th.—The New York and Montreal Stock Exchanges were closed on Saturday and will not reopen until Tuesday.

London, Sept. 4th.—A despatch to the "Daily Mail" from Madras says it is understood that an ultimatum has been sent by the British Govt. to the rebels, demanding their surrender within forty-eight hours.

Calicut, Sept. 4th.—About forty Moplah tribesmen and two British soldiers were killed in a fight of several hours at Tirunangadi which resulted in the capture of Ali Mudenier, the rebel leader, and thirty other Moplahs. Four British soldiers were wounded. Explosive material and a number of carbines, knives, swords and other weapons were captured. Another leader and two rebels have been arrested at Tanur. Fears are entertained for the harvest, owing to the paralyzing of labor.

Cleveland, Sept. 4th.—A movement to have all churches of the United States open an hour on the morning of armistice day November 11th for appropriate services to crystallize opinion in support of the disarmament conference which will convene in Washington that day has been started by the National League of Women voters. Letters have been sent to all National Womens organizations inviting their cooperation.

Paris, Sept. 5th.—The Islamic information bureau here received a message from Constantinople today, dated Sept. 1st, which says: "The Kemalists have repelled victoriously the attacks of the Greek armies along the Sakaria river. The number of Greeks killed, wounded or ill is numerous."

Geneva, Sept. 5th.—The second assembly of the League of Nations began its sessions today in an atmosphere of optimism and with as much enthusiasm as might reasonably be expected from so sober a body. It was demonstrated at the outset that the popular branch of the league was meeting entirely free from a pre-arranged programme. The assembly was called to order and heard the opening address of Dr. Wellington Koo,

of China, without having any idea as to who might be selected permanent President. Half a dozen candidates had been vaguely mentioned in the past few days, but the real canvass of possibilities began only yesterday, with the arrival of the important delegation. The only business transacted in the morning was the election of a committee on credentials and it was not until the luncheon recess that the delegates could exchange notes as to their choice of a presiding officer. South America came forward with Dr. Gaston da Cunha, of Brazil, and De Juan Carlos Tilanco, Uruguayan Minister at Paris, while there was a very important movement in favor of Dr. Van Karnebeek, Dutch Minister of Foreign Affairs, who was eventually elected to the Presidency.

London, Sept. 5th.—Labour candidates were heavily defeated in municipal bye-election in Balington, where the case of assistance demanded by the unemployed was a deciding issue in the campaign.

London, Sept. 5th.—Final results of the general election in the province of Victoria, Australia, show that the Govt. won a seat in the suburbs of Melbourne and lost no seats. The state of the parties is Govt. 82, Labour 21, Farmers 12. The election was almost entirely fought on the Govt's intention to abolish the wheat pool, the cabinet having recently decided that the time was opportune for decontrol in pursuance of its policy of non-interference in commercial activities. The Premier, Mr. Lawson, in announcing his policy, said increasing supplies of tonnage had entirely changed the situation and representatives of the leading overseas firms had expressed willingness to finance the coming harvest. The Parliament of Victoria will assemble on Sept. 6th. The state of the parties in the last assembly was, Govt. (Liberal) 29, Independent Liberals 2, Farmers 12, Labour 20, Independent Labour 1.

Simla, Sept. 5th.—Lord Reading, during the course of a speech at a joint sitting of the Council of State and the Legislative assembly on Saturday last, said it would be wrong to assume that the rising of Moplahs in the Malabar district was symptomatic of the whole of India, as that district has always been a storm centre. Referring to the proclamation of martial law in the Malabar area, the Viceroy declared the British authorities have failed in their duty if they had not taken that step and supported the local Govt to the utmost in quelling the rising and protecting innocent citizens. It was obvious that the outbreak which assumed the character of a rebellion, had been carefully prepared, Lord Reading asserted, and that no effort had been spared to rouse the passions and fury of the Moplahs.

Bille France, Sept. 3rd.—The textile strike which began in the middle of August in the triangle formed by the ci-
