ABOUT JACK JOHNSON.

THE Montreal Herald of Jan. 29. has it that Jack Johnson, former heavy-weight pugilistic champion of the world has made up his mind to fight Jack Dempsey before the latter meets Georges Carpentier, the French pugilist who recently defeated Joe Beckett, the English holder of the European title. Johnson plans to return to the United State at once - this news was cabled from Mexico on the day of its publication--to face charges pending against him in Chicago. He is confident that he can arrange legal difficulties in time before Dempsey's encounter with Carpentier, and he asserts that the former must meet him before he claims the world's championship. It is said that Johnson would go to New York by the way of Havana, arranging through the American Embassy here for the Federal agents from Mr. Clyne's office to meet him in New York. This step was for the purpose of avoiding complications. Johnson requested Mr. Clyne to give him thirty-six hours of leeway after he arrived in Chicago so that he might secure bondsmen and make other legal preparations.

Johnson asserted yesterday that he weighed 213 pounds, but would go into training immediately after reaching the United States and would be able to easily make his old fighting weight. During the eight years that Johnson has been out of the United States he has visited virtually every country in the Old World and South America.--Dominica Guardian.

MARRIAGE SUPERSTITIONS

In some parts of Germany the duties of the bridesmaids are tinged with superstition. It is one of their duties on the morning of the marriage day to carry to the bride a myrtle wreath, for which they had subscribed on the previous evening. This they place on her head, and at night remove it, when it is placed in the bride's hand, she being at the time blindfolded. The bridesmaids then dance round her, while she endeavors to place the wreath on one of their heads. Whoever is fortunate enough to be thus decorated will, it is believed, be a wife before another year has passed. In removing the bridal wreath and veil, the bridesmaids are careful to throw away every pin, or the bride will be overtaken by misfortune; while any unwary bridesmaid who retains one will lessen her chances of marriage--Everyday Life.
