TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

Christiania, June 4th.—A Norwegian navy vessel with a special expedition aboard, sailed on Saturday for Spitzbergen, to establish a base at Danes Island, from which airplanes, will reconnoitre for Raold Amundsen, who is to attempt a flight across the North Pole this month. Five supply depots will be placed along the ice barrier in big airtight copper boxes, to make them proof against attack by bears. Each box will contain enough provisions for three weeks and a note telling the place where the other depots are located, two naval airplanes will always be in the air together, so as to be able to assist each other. Each will have provisions for a week. A small airplane will be used for scouting purposes. The expedition consists of 12 men, including a wireless operator, a physician and some of the most competent naval operators.

London, June 4th.—Great Britain will have the largest and most powerful sub-

marine in the world when the mystery submarine XI is completed. This giant underwater craft, which will soon be launched at Chatham, will displace 2,880 tons and 2,000 tons when submerged. This displacement is greater by more than a thousand tons than that of any foreign submarine now afloat. The XI will mount a 12-inch gun. She will be able to bombard an object at long or short range and then slip quickly beneath the waves. It is her great speed and gun-power which will surpass anything in her class. She will be more than a match for most surface vessels. The submarine was laid down only eighteen months ago, the Admiralty has congratulated her builders on the speed with which they have done their work.

London, June 5th.—The West Indian XI yesterday played their first innings in the continued match against Middlesex at Lords scoring 264. Individual scores were as follows: Nunes 6, Holt 21, Challenor 94, Snail 5, Ince 25, extra 18, total 264. Tarlton was absent on account of illness. Middlesex then went to bat for their second innings and at the close of play had compiled 62 runs for the loss of six wickets. The weather throughout the play was exceptionally cold and dull.

New York, June 3rd.—Eugene Criqui of France, here of Verdun, won the feather weight championship of the world yesterday, knocking out Johnny Kilbane, of Cleveland, Ohio, in the sixth round of a 15 round match.

Paris, June 4th.—Mr. Stanley Baldwin in a statement to "Le Petit Parisien" says: "I had the good fortune last winter to succeed in settling the delicate question of the Anglo-American debt. If the European questions now pending are approached in the same spirit I do not see why we cannot manage to settle them also. In any case, you can count on me to do my part with the greatest determination. Perhaps at the beginning we will meet temporary checks, but I am certain that in the end success will crown our efforts."

London, June 4th.—Mr. Baldwin has been credited with the intention of taking a stronger line than Mr. Bonar Law in the question of the Ruhr and reparations and the statement he has made to a Paris newspaper has awakened new interest in this subject. According to the best information, however, all reports that the Government has prepared a new plan for the solution of the reparations' difficulty or that the Prime Minister has any present idea of going to Paris to consult with M. Poincare, are unfounded. Everything is supposed to be waiting on the coming conference between the French and Belgian statesmen and the new German note which is not expected to be received until towards the end of the week.
