Police Notice.

1. The Public is hereby notified that in event of an impending hurricane the following signals will be given at Christiansted, Frederiksted, King's Hill and Richmond Penitentiary:—

Two sky rockets will be fired at an interval of five minutes and the hurricane flag (red with black centre) will be displayed.

2. These rockets when fired rise to a height of approximately two hundred feet and when at their greatest height explode with a loud noise similar to that produced by a small cannon.

3. These signals will be given only when it is reasonably certain that this island will experience a very strong wind and all persons should immediately prepare for a hurricane, when two rockets are heard or seen.

4. News of a passing hurricane which is not expected to strike this island will spread only by telephone as the rockets signals are limited.

5. The firing of one rocket or three or more rockets should be disregarded by the public as those signals are only for the use of the Police Department.

6. In addition to the above signals the towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted will be further notified of an impending hurricane by a policeman or marine going through the streets beating a drum or sounding a bugle.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sept. 21st.—Sugar in stock on the 17th instant was 124,000 tons. Last year 128,000 tons.

Grenada, Sept. 22nd.—With reference to the telegram of 12th instant from Grenada reporting results of storm of 8th instant original estimate much exaggerated. Very little damage was done to cocoa or provisions. Nutmeg trees have been destroyed to the extent of approximately 10%. Instead of the damage being as originally stated £100,000, it is not likely to be more than £20,000. The Legislative Council is to be
