Introduction of and 1st Discussion on Colonial Council Bill No. 40, Draft of an Ordinance introduced by 2nd Appointed Member (Noll), declaring the time when the Ordinance passed by the Colonial Council of St. Croix providing for a compiled Code of General and Special Laws shall take effect.

Discussion on Resolution introduced by Government authorizing the establishment and management of a training school on Protestant Cay for incorrigible girls.

eleven o'clock, and began the consideration of the programme which will be discussed with the German delegates at the meeting at Spa next week. German experts submitted to the Council a memorandum regarding the economic situation of Germany, and ability to meet reparation demands. This memorandum made a very unfavourable impression upon conference circles, as it was regarded as a manoeuvre intended to prepare the way for strong resistance to the execution of the treaty by the German Delegation at Spa. It was also taken as confirmation of reports from Berlin that the attitude of Herr Frehenback, German Chancellor and head of the German Spa Delegation, will be that financial settlement must be made on a basis of the present economic situation of Germany without taking into account any future economic improvements. The memorandum tries to es-
