The Money Order and Stamp Windows will be opened from 8 a. m. to noon and from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. regardless of the arrival or dispatching of mails. Service CANNOT be obtained at these windows AFTER 5 p. m.

The General Delivery and Parcel Post Windows will be closed during the noon hour and whenever mails are being distributed.

Ordinarily, the outer doors of the office will be closed 6 p. m.

Do not knock at the Windows when they are closed—IT WILL BE USELESS.

Do not bring your mail to the back of the office (through the yard)—IT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

If you want to mail sealed parcels of merchandise as Fourth Class matter, let us tell you how it can be done.

See the cards in the stationary mail-pans outside of the office for the time these receptacles are emptied.

If there is anything wrong with the Service from your angle, you will not help or remedy it by playing Mark Anthony under the gallery or in the lobby of the office. Tell us your case. We want to know about every case of loss, delay, wrong delivery, or any other improper treatment of mail matter addressed to you or mailed by you. ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, May 24th.—The President has forwarded to the Senate a recommendation of Mr. Hughes that United States sovereignty be extended over Swains Islands, an isolated island at 011,200 miles east southeast of Apia, Samoa. The State Department records show that the British mariner who discovered the isolated island deeded it to an American and that the sovereignty of that country should be conceded by Great Britain, the only other country which might have an interest.
