TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 9th. - The Hon Albinia Brodrick, sister of the Earl of Midleton, has been hunger striking for twelve days in a Dublin poor house and is in a very weak condition, says a Dublin despatch to the Morning Post.

New York, May 9th. - The raw sugar market was firmer early today and prices were 1/2 cent higher with Cubas now quo-

ted at 6 1/2 c cost and freight, equal to 8 15 for centrifugal, with sales reported of 15,000 bags at that level. Porto Rico's however were lower. Raw sugar futures were easy at the start, but after showing declines of three to five points, under scattered liquidation, prices rallied on covering and renewed buying for trade and Cuban account, prompted by the firmness of the spot market and reports of a continued good export inquiry for refined. There were no changes in refined sugar prices. With fine granulated listed at 9.75 to 9.90, there was only moderate domestic inquiry reported but a continued good export demand with sales to Italy, said to be in the neighbourhood of 10,000 tons, during the past few days and more wanted. Refined futures were nominal.

New York, May 9th. - Federal Judge Mayer announced this afternoon that the Government's application for an injunction to restrain the New York Coffee and Sugar Exchange and the New York Coffee and Sugar Association from dealing in sugar futures had been denied.

Washington, May 9th. - The refusal of Federal Judge Mayer, in New York, to enjoin the New York Sugar Exchange in dealing in sugar futures, may result in a direct appeal which will bring the case without delay before the Supreme Court. Although declining to discuss Judge Mayer's action in detail, department of justice officials indicated that they were prepared to continue vigorously the fight they have begun in the courts against those they hold responsible for recent sugar price increases.

London, May 9th. - For the second consecutive year "Chivalrous", a five year old colt, won the Chester Cup, the feature race of today's programme at Chester and one of the important long distance races run over the flat. "Chivalrous", who started at 100 to 14 against finished a length ahead of "Happy Man", who was strongly supported at 5 to 1 against. "Bellman", a four year old bay gelding by son-in-law, quoted at 100 to 6 against, finished third beaten by a length and a half. Seventeen horses started.

Paris, May 9th. - Herr Schlogetter was convicted of sabotage by a French court martial sitting at Dusseldorf today and sentenced to death, according to a Havas despatch from Dusseldorf.

London, May 9th. - The King was somewhat indisposed today, in consequence of the exceptional heat in Rome and his crowded programme and probably also the unaccustomed cooking, according to the Times Correspondent in that City. It was rumoured this morning, the correspondent adds, that the King was seriously indisposed and that the days programme would be cancelled, but he was able to make the effort and appeared in his usual health at a garden party, at the British Embassy this afternoon.
