New York, Aug. 10th.—A crew of British yachting sailors in the employment of Sir Thomas Lipton arrived today on the Zeeland to take Sir Thomas 23 metre racing yacht Shamrock back to England where she will be used as a trial horse for the new yacht he has ordered in a new attempt to capture the famous America's Cup. The Shamrock was used in both British and United States waters in 1920 as a peace maker for the Shamrock IV since then she has been in storage.

London, Aug. 11th.—Dr. Owens, head of the commission of the Southern Commercial Congress, which has been investigating conditions with a view of betterment of trade relations with Europe, has received a telegram from the German Foreign Office saying that the Government approved in principle the commissions plan for amortization of the inter-Allied debt and reparations, which was presented to Mr. Baldwin, the Premier, on Thursday. The German acceptance was made "without, however, binding the German Government to any fixed capital sum of reparation debt and without prejudice to the moratorium demanded by Germany."

Winnipeg, August 11th.—American steamship companies have put into effect their threat not to carry Canadian grain to market, as a protest against the new Canadian law which requires them to file their tariffs with the Board of Grain Commissioners at Fort William, states a special despatch to the Manitoba Free Press from Fort William. With American boats concentrating on their own grain trade, it is anticipated at the head of the lakes that under the tremendous

handicap of moving a record crop with inefficient boats, Canadian grain will be later in reaching overseas buyers and American grain will thus be sold ahead of that grown in the Canadian West, according to the despatch.

London, Aug. 11th.—Mr Baldwin, on Friday, expressed complete approval of the International Trade Commission's proposal for the settlement of reparations and inter-Allied debts, following a conference with Dr. Clarence W. Owens, President of the Commission, and Senator Ralph Metcalf, Secretary, who explained the scheme by which they believed the financial troubles of Europe might be overcome. Dr. Owens and Senator Metcalf were sent to Europe on behalf of the Southern Trade Congress, for the purpose of studying foreign financial conditions and reparations. The international trade commission is a working instrument of the Southern Trade Congress. Last week they discussed their schemes with high officials at the Wilhelmstrasse in Berlin, who agreed with it in principle. The next move is to put it up to M. Poincare in person. Briefly, the scheme is that the Allies and the United States agree to accept three percent on money owed them, plus one half of one percent sinking fund, all to agree also to pay that three and a half percent on their own debts. This would wipe out inter-Allied debts and reparations in about 67 years. Doctor Owens proposed this arrangement should also apply to the British debt to America. The plan also provides for a moratorium to such nations as manifestly needed it, like Germany, the Reichs indemnity would be

fixed to about \$12,000,000,000.

London, Aug. 11th.—The dockers strike in London has lasted six weeks now, yet the food prices have not been affected, as the supplies come freely through Southampton, where the dockers have raised no objection to the unloading of vessels which have been diverted from London. What seems to keep the strike going in London is the scale of the poor law relief. In Poplar and Bermondsey the poor law guardians are paying anything up to 52 shillings a week as a dole. The poor law rates compare so favourably with dock wages that men actually are better off by drawing the dole than if they were employed 3 or 4 days a week, the usual run of dock employment. The strike in fact is virtually subsidised by the local taxes that are paid to keep up the dole. A large body of the ratepayers propose to make representations on the matter to the Ministry of Health, which is supposed to control the local authorities in questions of finance. The Borough of Poplar alone is spending 6,000 pounds a week in relief. Some companies affected by the dockers strike have set their office clerks at work unloading vessels.

Cowes Isle Of Wight, Aug. 11th.—Great Britain won the British-American Cup for six metre yachts.

New York, Aug. 11th.—Alarmed over continued dry weather in Texas with no prospects for relief over Sunday, the cotton market rose fully \$4.00 per bale this morning, October and December advancing to \$23.80.

Berlin, Aug. 12th.—Eleven persons were killed and many others were wounded yesterday in a clash between striking workmen and peasants at Aix la Chapelle according to a report reaching Berlin this afternoon. After Friday's raid on nearby farms by city workers the peasants organized protection squads, which yesterday morning proceeded to repulse invaders who attempted forcibly to seize crops and stores of food.

Crefeld, Prussia, Aug. 12th.—During the plundering of food shops here and other demonstrations against food shortage and the currency stringency, four demonstrators were killed and about 30 wounded, several of whom are expected to die, during a clash with the newly organized police. Several textile plants, which have contracts with United States importers, were seized by the demonstrators, some of whom carried red flags. Virtually all the manufacturing districts of Crefeld is at a standstill owing to the demonstrations.

Berlin, Aug. 12th.—Three times today Communists at Rotthausen erected gallows with figures of Chancellor Cuno and Hugo Stinnes swinging from them, but each time the police tore them down. The proceedings ended in a ugly rush on the police by the crowd, in which one policeman and five demonstrators were killed and ten wounded.
