

Moplabs entrenched on the hillsides. The policemen replied, killing twenty three of the tribesmen. One policeman was killed and 8 of them were wounded, including the Assistant Superintendent of Police.

Washington, Oct. 31st.—A resolution authorizing and requiring the President to call an international conference to consider the constantly increasing pollution of navigable streams from dumping of oil refuse by steamships, was introduced today by representative Applyby, republican, New Jersey. The casting of oil refuse into the sea near the shore line, the resolution sets forth, has created a serious menace likely to result in fires and the destruction of ocean fisheries. The Nations controlling and operating ocean shipping would be asked to participate in the conference.

Madrid, Oct. 31st.—Severe fighting took place between Spanish-Moroccan troops and the rebellious Moorish tribesmen in the vicinity of Magan, according to despatches yesterday from war correspondents at Ceuta.

St. Johns N. F. Oct. 31st.—There is still no sign of the abatement of the great storm of northeast wind, which with an accompanying heavy sea, has been ravaging the east coast of Newfoundland since Friday last. As the days pass, stories come from outlying sections showing that the damage done by the gale and breakers to shore property will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Warsaw, Oct. 29th.—The Soviet legation here announced yesterday that there had been a new invasion of the Ukraine, under the direction of General Petelura the anti-Bolshevik leader, from Polish territory. The town of Gusatin and Grodek have been taken by the Petelura troops and a battle is raging at Kamenetz-Podolsk. The Soviet authorities here have demanded an explanation from the Polish Foreign Office.

New York, Oct. 31st.—Sir Robert Borden, who will represent Canada at the Washington conference on limitation of armaments and discussion on Pacific and Far Eastern questions, arrived here this morning.

New Port, R. I. Oct. 31st.—The illness of Rear Admiral William Sims, who has suffered for several days with a slight cold and a touch of indigestion, developed today into pleurisy. Commander Norman McLean, his attending physician said Admiral Sims condition was not serious, but that he probably would have to remain in bed for at least two weeks. The illness will prevent the Admiral from participating in the exercises at Washington in connection with the burial of the body of the unknown soldier on Armistice Day, Commander McLean said.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 31st.—Mr. J. R. Scriven has been appointed Canadian Trade Commissioner in Jamaica, and is

one of the Junior Trade Commissioners who was trained in Canada. He is now enroute from Havana, Cuba, to Jamaica to assume his duties.

Ottawa, Nov. 1st.—Lady Laurier widow of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, died at her home today. Lady Laurier was in her eightieth year, and caught a chill while out walking recently.

Lisbon, Nov 1st.—A bomb exploded this morning on the staircase at the United States Consulate here. No damage was done, however. The police attribute the outrage to the agitation in connection with the cases of Sacco and Vanzetti the two Italians under conviction of murder in the United States.

New York, Nov. 1st.—Repayment of \$300,000,000, borrowed in the New York market in 1916 was completed by the British Govt. today with the redemption of between \$51,000,000 and \$52,000,000 in 5½ per cent bonds.

London, Nov. 3rd.—Sugar in stock on the 29th ult., was 72,000 tons. Last year 117,000 tons.

Kansas City, Nov. 1st.—Three of the well known leaders of the men in the great war, Amiral Earl Beatty, General Diaz and General Jacquea, addressed the American Legion assembled in convention here yesterday. Each was received and decorated with the official emblem of the Legion. Marshal Foch and General Pershing arrived here yesterday. Greetings from the veterans in Canada and Great Britain were also extended to the Legion yesterday. Admiral Beatty's address was an appeal to the Legion members to continue in peace the comradeship among Allied nations that existed during the war. This, he said, was the great lesson of the struggle. The message from Italy by General Diaz was one of the faith in the United States, while to this Genl. Jacques added Belgium's gratitude for aid during the war.

London, Nov. 1st.—Peace negotiations between representative of the Govt. and delegates of the Dail Eireann were resumed at Number 10 Downing Street this morning. Michael Collins and Arthur Griffith, representing the Dail Eireann arrived at Downing Street at 10 o'clock, accompanied by skink children, Secretarp to the Sinn Fein delegates. It was said that they went there in response to a message from Mr. Lloyd George. The meeting last about twenty-five minutes, after which it was said another committee meeting was being held. The Govt. representatives present were Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Austen Chamberlain, and Lord Birkenland.
