Editor "St. Croix Avis".

Dear Mr. Editor:—

Not being "landed" by our worthy friend Mr Tutein I am asking you to have the kindness to insert this letter in an early issue of the Avis. Herewith is an extract from the St. Thomas Bulletin of 25th. instat, speaking for itself, and showing up very glaringly that while this island is raising any amount of stock, and shipping it at good prices to other markets, the people at home are getting no benefits of this lucrative export trade having to pay according to latest price list published by the Food Commission, 22 cts. for beef and 24 cts. for veal as against 18 and 19 cents respectively for the same in St. Thomas. Readers will note the other requirements embodied in the notice and there is little chance that anyone will be able to contend that

sails, manila and wist rope, paint and paint-oil having gone up in price is why we here in St. Croix must continue to pay about 50% more for the things we produce than the people in St. Thomas, cattle unlike fish not subsisting on those items of hardware. This is no attack on the butchers nor anyone at all for that matter, but simply an open representation of fact concerning which an explanation by those concerned would be welcomed or a discussion started with a view to familiarizing people with these stunts in buying and selling that bid fair to warrant a revolution in arithmetical circles. That the meat sold for veal is often more like elephant hide is of course a question we will leave for another day, but for the present information is sought from the Food Commission why the island of St. Croix is ruled to pay higher prices in nearly every instance than St. Thomas. Prices of other commodities remain as heretofore fixed by the Food Commission.

An extra charge of one cent, per pound, may be made for articles covered by the Food Commission's price list, retailed on the Island of St. John.

Hereafter cattle will be purchased by weight. Butchers are required to keep a record of each and every purchase, which will include the name of the person from whom the purchase is made, the number of cattle purchased, the gross weight, the price per pound paid and the total amount paid, which record shall be available to the Food Commission at all times.
