TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Oct. 3rd.—Newspapers of this city are unanimous in rejoicing over the

vote in favour of the ratification of the peace treaty in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday and express the opinion that the majority in favour of ratification will assist materially in bringing the treaty to a vote in the United States' Senate.

London, Oct. 3rd. The following was issued from the Premier's headquarters in Downing Street this evening: "A series of meetings with the Prime Minister and Mr. Bonar Law which commenced on Wednesday last at the instance of a deputation of trades unionists, headed by Mr. Gosling, President of the Transport Workers' Union, came to an end this afternoon. Thursday's proposed basis for the continuance of the negotiations were: First. That on the strikers return to work, the negotiations shall be resumed where they were broken off last Friday. Second. That in accordance with the Premier's offer of Friday, the Government will guarantee that there will be no reduction of wages until March 31st, and the Government undertakes that at any time after the 31st of December, they will be ready to discuss in view of the circumstances then existing, the possible extension of that date."

London, Oct. 3rd.—The Home Office has issued an appeal for the formation throughout the country of "Citizens guards" to assist the Police and special constables in protecting peaceful citizens and for the maintenance of supplies of foodstuffs and necessities of life. An official statement issued from Downing Street this evening, says that National Union of railwaymen has rejected the Government's offer of arbitration and also a seven days' truce proposed by the Government.

Chicago, Oct. 2nd.—The Chicago White Sox today served emphatic notice that they were still in the world's championship contest by defeating Cincinnati 3 to 0. The series now stands Cincinnati 3 Chicago 1. Six more games are possible.

Washington, Oct. 3rd.—President Wilson's condition was described in a bulletin issued tonight from the White House by his physician Dr. Grayson. The bulletin follows: "Ten p.m., White House. The President's condition today is about the same with a slight improvement. Grayson" Dr. Grayson who met the newspapermen, declined to elaborate on the brief bulletin. It was understood that the President was able to take some nourishment and got some sleep during the day. There was another consultation of physicians today and the immediate members of the President's family came to the White House to be near him. Although reticent about details of the conditions of their patient, those who attended him indicated that his ailment had not yet clearly revealed the extent of its inroad on his system and that some days might be required to disclose its full effect, nervous exhaustion from which he is suffering, complicated with his

long standing weakness of the digestive organs and a lingering touch of last Spring's attack of influenza the doctors say have considerably weakened the President's power of resistance for a man of his years. However President Wilson's general physical system is said to be in good condition to stand the attack against which he is now fighting.

Balmoral, Oct. 3rd: The King left today for London by motor car on account of the interruption of railway traffic.

London, Oct. 3rd:—At a full meeting of the Cabinet this afternoon, presided over by the Premier, the Premier's statement that negotiations could be entered into with the National Union of Railwaymen before it has given orders to the men to return to work, was unanimously agreed to.

Madrid, Oct. 3rd.—One hundred persons have been drowned and loss exceeding 20,000,000 pesos has been caused, it is estimated by floods in South-western Spain and bad news continues to come in. In the city of Cartagena many were drowned by the inundation of the town and 30 villages were still isolated by the floods on Thursday night. Two fishing boats were wrecked in the Strait of Torrevieja, near Alicante, by the violent hail storm by which also the roofs of a number of buildings were crushed in. Many small houses have been demolished and large houses undermined.

London, Oct. 3rd.—After seven days the railway strike situation tonight became the gravest in the history of any labour crisis of the British Empire in the present generation. All efforts of transport workers federation to find a basis of negotiation between the Govt. and the National Union of Railwaymen, failed. The Premier, in the course of a conference today, made an impassioned appeal to the railway men, to accept the offer of arbitration and it is reported that delegates of the transport workers were in favour of accepting the offer. Robert Williams, Genl. Secretary of the Transport Workers' Union, in a statement to the press tonight, referred to the break down in negotiations today as "Lamentable", announcing that a Congress of Trade Unions had been convened for Tuesday to engage in any form of moral and sympathetic support of the railwaymen in the struggle they are waging for trades unionism. In the meantime, Mr. Williams added: "The delegates who had been consulting with Mr. Lloyd George from day to day, would be made officers of the Transport Workers federation, in order to formulate proposals they were convinced would prove acceptable to the entire trades union movement of the Kingdom." In addition to the Delegates of the Transport Workers Federation, who include Arthur Henderson and John R. Clynes, Mr. Williams asserted, these new officers would include Frank Hodges, C. H.
