WILH. JENSEN RECEIVES TEM-
PORARY APPOINTMENT.
OFFICIAL NOTES.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Demerara, March 30th.—Mr. Joseph Kidd partner in the firm of Pairaudeau and Co and Consul for Norway died here yesterday.

Keywest Fla, March 31st.—The Naval station here received at 10 o'clock this morning a wireless call for help from Nassau, Bahama Islands, where it was reported a fire of great proportion was raging. No details were available.

London, March 30th.—There appeared to be some doubt prevalent today as to whether Mr. Lloyd George would secure a vote of confidence in the House of Commons next Monday, when he outlines the Govts. programme at the Genoa economic conference and asks the lower house of Parliament to sanction it. Mr. Austin Chamberlain today parried the question of Mr. Asquith, as to whether any agreement had been arrived at during the Boulogne conference between Mr. Lloyd George and M. Poincare, limiting the subjects to be discussed at Genoa. Mr. Chamberlain merely informed Mr. Asquith that the Premier would deal fully with the Genoa conference in his speech on Monday. The Liberals, following another meeting today, decided to propose an amendment to the conference resolution which Mr. Lloyd George proposes to place before the House as follows. "That the House, while regretting the limitation on subjects for discussion, approves the holding of a general conference, but declines to express confidence in his Majesty's Government with regard thereto."
