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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Sept. 23rd.—The Incognito Cricket Team won its match against the All New York eleven at Livingston, State Island, by an innings and 141 runs. The visitors scored 377 runs yesterday.

Paris, Sept. 23rd.—Replying today to congratulations of M. Bourgeois President of the Senate, on his election to the Presidency, of France, M. Millerand gave assurance that he would discharge the duties of his post in accordance with the constitution. Victorious France must rebuild its ruins and repair its wounds. We must continue a foreign policy worthy of our victory and our dead. The Republican whom Congress has just designated as President will bring to the discharge of his duties all his intelligence and energy and try to be worthy of the confidence of the people representative.

London, Sept. 24th.—As a result of a further conference with Mr. Lloyd George concerning the threatened coal strike, the miners executive body decided today to recommend to the delegates of the miners, who are meeting this afternoon, that the strike notices which are effective Saturday be suspended one week to enable the miners to meet the owners, as suggested by the Premier. The Premier's proposal was that a basic line be fixed for coal output at a sufficiently low level to insure a wage increase if any reasonable rate of production is maintained. The recommendation of the Executive body was followed by the miners delegates at the meeting later in the afternoon, and it was decided to suspend the strike notices one week as requested by the Premier.

Dublin, Sept. 24th.—At a meeting of the Wexford Magistrates, a resolution was introduced by Colonel Bryan to repeal the union of Great Britain, and give the Prince of Wales the crown of Ireland as the best means of uniting Ireland and realizing Irish national aspirations. The resolution was defeated.

Riga, Sept. 24th.—Adolph Joffe, head of the Soviet delegation, at today's session of the Russo-Polish Peace conference proposed an armistice, which he said must be accepted by the Poles within ten days, or the Russian winter campaign would be inaugurated, which he declared the Soviet Govt. desired to avoid.

Brussels, Sept. 24th.—One hundred Delegates have arrived here from 40 states for the International Financial Congress organized by the League of Nations, which will begin its sessions today. All the allied and associated countries and all the former enemy states, except Turkey, are represented. The financial experts will take up immediately after the opening speech by ex-President Ador of Switzerland the question of the financial ill of the world generally and of individual states particularly and the proposed remedies. Reparations and inter allied war debts will not be discussed, these questions having been erased from the programme.

Dublin, Sept. 24th.—The general post office was raided and robbed by armed men last night. The miscreants blew open the safe and decamped with several thousand pounds of money comprising the wages and bonuses of the pay office staff.
