TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, March 21st.—Reports from
Queenstown thus far give the impres-
sion that the attack on the British sol-
diers was carried out in a fanatical way
by a few irresponsibles. The Free State
army chiefs immediately began an in-
vestigation and a wide search is being
made for the perpetrators.

Dublin, March 22nd.—General Liam
Tobin, leader of the mutinous army offi-

cers, this afternoon issued a statement
on behalf of the mutineers saying: "We
disclaim any responsibility for the cow-
ardly acts in Queenstown." The reason
for the attack is still not clear. There
has been great unrest, however, since
the decision of the Government a week
ago to reduce the army from 50,000 to
18,000 and to demobilize nearly 1,000 offi-
cers.

London, March 22nd.—The latest re-
ports to the War Office from Queens-
town received today give the casualties
in yesterday's shooting as follows: One
officer seriously wounded. One private
dead of wounds, eight dangerously
wounded and five civilians including two
women wounded.

London, March 23rd.—There was no
change today in the situation growing
out of the strike yesterday of the en-
ployees of the tramway and omnibus
services. Neither side to the dispute
evinced any disposition to give in. A
court of inquiry sat both this morning
and this afternoon, taking evidence with
regard to the situation. It is expected
the court will present its report to the
Labour Ministry within a few days. A
feature of today's session of the court
was the general admission that there
was need for some central control of
communication and transportation facili-
ties, in order to remedy the existing com-
petition and overlapping. It is believed
that the court's report may recommend
that the Government introduce legisla-
tion in Parliament to attain this object.

London, March 23rd.—There has been
some question as to just what the Prime
Minister said in his House of Commons
statement on Tuesday, regarding the re-
lation of the Singapore project to the
Washington Naval Agreement. Exami-
nation of the full text of the statement,
however, shows that the Premier clea-
rly held that the development of the na-
val base would not be inconsistent with
the Washington Pact. The Government's
abandonment of the scheme was not on
the score that it conflicted with the
Washington Treaty, but because the Gov-
ernment stood for international concilia-
tion and hoped for conditions which
would make comprehensive armament
limitation possible and considered that to
proceed with the project would exercise a
most detrimental effect on Great Brit-
ain's general foreign policy.

Washington, March 22nd.—The Naval
Appropriation Bill, carrying \$272,000,000,
was passed by the House.

Paris, March 22nd.—General George
Nivelle, who commanded the French
troops at Verdun during the European
War, is dead.

Crookston, Minn., March 22nd.—The
Merchants National Bank of Crookston
one of the oldest and largest financial
institutions in North-Western Minnesota
closed its doors today and a national
bank examiner took charge. The bank's
deposits were in excess of \$1,000,000.
