The Editor "St. Croix Avis",

Mr. Editor;---

As our final word to those who have not hesitated to chronicle us as "ignorant" because we understand English in the only way we can understand it, permit us to say that the notice from Government of May 5, states that Ramsay, Coogan & Co., Inc. "ARE hereby DECLARED to be DISSOLVED and shall be extinct in all respects," which means that the corporation was dissolved with and on the date of appearance of that notice. Mr. Coogan seems to overlook that *are declared to be dissolved* is the same as *is dissolved*. Even in our "ignorance" we can understand that. The quotation in today's paper omits the last part of Section 23 which would appear to apply to this case, and not the part quoted as the four notices have not appeared previous to the Government's. The conclusion of Section 23 makes the Government's notice clearer than ever.

Feeling that we shall not be contradicted by students of English, this is declared to be our last letter on the subject.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Genoa, May 18th. The delegates are preparing to leave as soon as the plenary session has terminated. This will be mainly devoted to speeches, and interest

is chiefly centered on those of Mr. Lloyd George and M. Tchitcherin. The former announces that he will not make a prepared speech, but will speak after the other delegates have been heard and that he will endeavour to make his remarks a reply to each one of them. The Russian delegation will not leave before Monday and reports are current that the Soviets may conclude other agreements before proceeding to Berlin, where several members of the Bolshevik delegation intend to remain until just before leaving for the Hague. Important developments are expected in Russian relations during the forthcoming weeks. An examination of the conference shows that it has never recovered from the blow it received by the separate Russo-German treaty. One of the principal objects of the conference was the conclusion of a collective agreement with Russia, and the unexpected announcement that Germany had negotiated a separate agreement with Russia created suspicions among the powers which have never been dissipated. France suspecting that the Russo-German agreement contains secret military clauses and does not conceal her fears that the conference, instead of creating harmony in Europe has disorganized it.

London, May 19th. Today's rate of exchanges on markets was 1310 to the pound sterling.

London, May 19th.—Mr. Clynes, labour leader, in concluding an article in the "Manchester Despatch", dealing with the future labourite policy, says the rights and interests of Irishmen in their own country and also in Great Britain and the dominions can best be advanced by Irishmen not insisting on the establishment of a foreign republic in Ireland. Ireland, he says, would be safer with the moral and material weight of the Empire behind her and he believes that Irish unity will only come through a basis of empire relationship. An Irish civil war, he thinks, would be endless, and internal conflict will be the price of a persistent demand for a republic.

Washington, May 19th.—An army of one hundred and forty thousand men, with an average officer strength next year of approximately 12,520, has been agreed upon by the Senate appropriating sub-committee, which has charge of the measure.

Robstown, Texas, May 19th.—Twenty persons were injured, two of whom will probably die, and damage to property estimated at five hundred thousand dollars was caused when a tornado struck the town of Aguadulce, sixteen miles west of this city and swept eastward to Bishop fifteen miles to the south. The twister cut a path two to five miles wide and fifteen miles long.

London, May 19th.—The King has written a letter with regard to his recent visit to the war graves, in which he says he trust the high commissioners and oth-
