H. M. S. "Constance" will visit St. Croix on the 10th inst., remaining for four days.

The s. s. "Parima" for New York is due at Frederiksted at daylight on Saturday morning.

"The Sign Invisible" is the drama constituting tonight's programme at St. Mary's. The name suggests something unusual; the picture will tell.

"Mathias Sandorff" a screen reproduction from Jules Verne's novel of that name was screened at the theatre last night with much success. It is a film out of the ordinary and presents points uncommon in the generality of screen dramas. The story is laid in Europe during the time when Hungary was a

vassal of France and plots were being made to foment a revolution. The interception of messages by ear, the upsetting of schemes, the capture and escape of the hero form features that appeal to the loftier minds. We can recommend this picture to the people of Frederiksted where it will be presented at St. Paul's School House tonight.

Just before the show last night a scuffle ensued between Patrolman McGregor and one Nathaniel Millington who showed fight and had to be roughly handled in order to carry him to the fort whither he was being conducted for some disorder. This resistance of the policemen is going to have serious consequences for our people if they insist on it. In the States the slightest resistance shown a cop can have fatal effect. Here we have policemen who are more or less considerate to everybody and we should aid rather than obstruct their performance of duty. If a policeman exceeds his right in executing his duty or what he may regard as his duty redress can be obtained, but fighting the cops on the public streets will only bring about and encourage disregard for lawful authority.
