Lausanne, July 24th.—The Lausanne peace treaty, formally reestablishing peace between the European powers and Turkey was signed today.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Santa Barbara, Calif., July 22nd.—William Fildes, United States open tennis champion, won in straight sets from Manuel Alonzo, Spanish star, on the Courts country club here yesterday 6-3, 7-5, 6-4. Hull, July 22nd.—The dockers at a mass meeting tonight unanimously resolved to continue the strike.

Belfast, July 22nd.—Sir James Craig,

Premier of Ulster, declared this afternoon that the report that he contemplated resigning to take a colonial appointment was a malicious falsehood. The report, which received wide circulation before it was overtaken by the Premier's denial, was apparently based on the absence of Sir James from Belfast last week during the Orange demonstrations.

Panama City, July 21st.—Reports received here of rumours circulated in the United States that the Panama Canal had been closed because of land slides, caused much surprise in the canal zone. The canal was in full operation today as usual.

London, July 22nd.—An indication of the extreme care extended in drafting the new reparation communication was given by Sir William Joynson-Hicks, financial secretary to the treasury, in the course of a speech to the Primrose League in the Crystal Palace yesterday afternoon. We have been gravely anxious the past few weeks regarding Foreign Affairs, said Sir William, with a constant series of cabinet meetings in the last fortnight to arrive at some position of stability on the continent ending in the despatch of a very long considered, very anxiously cared for draft letter, in the hope of arriving at a solution jointly with the Allies, so as to ensure the peace of the world. The Government, declared the speaker, desired to see the late enemy pay what he could and that justice be done to the claims of the Allies, as well as Great Britain, but it was impossible not to realize that until stability was achieved in Europe, the trade on which Great Britain vitally depended could never be satisfactory. Today the whole of Europe was unable to trade and unable to pay, because of the condition in Central Europe. He appealed to the Allies and the whole world for what was the world's greatest need, world peace.

Brussels, July 22nd.—The British note on reparations on its arrival here by special courier was immediately examined by Premier Theunis and Foreign Minister Jaspar and then translated. Both ministers studied it thoroughly and drew up points to constitute a basis for discussion at a council conference tomorrow, which was especially called for this purpose. The feeling in official quarters can be described as still optimistic and it is thought the diplomatic conversations, which now are entering upon a period of great activity, will be aided by developments in the situation in Germany which are considered to be evolving rapidly in a direction favourable to the Franco-Belgian policy. No immediate conversations between the French and Belgian ministers are contemplated at present, but the discussion will be continued through diplomatic channels.
