TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, June 8th.—Three hundred and ninety one deputies have so far been elected, including those from the Plesbiscite regions. The various parties are represented as follows: National Conservatives 48. Moderates 55. Centre 54. Democrats 42. Majority Socialists 97. Independents 69. Bavarian Popular Party 13. Other parties 13. President Ebert has charged Herr Muller with the formation of the new Cabinet.

Warsaw, June 7th.—In an attack on Glebokig we took 800 prisoners and enormous booty, the retreat of the enemy between the Dvina and the Beresina being transformed into a panic.

Rome, June 8th.—Albanian insurgents having occupied the villages of Bostrova and Selitza, Italian forces were thrown back on Avlona. A torpedo-boat anchored off Avlona and protected the Italians, who appear to have suffered some losses.

Vienna, June 8th.—Serious disturbances have occurred here in connection with the high prices of necessities, but were suppressed by the police, who were compelled to fire, killing seven persons and wounding twenty three. Many arrests were made.

Rome, June 8th.—An increase in the price of bread caused manifestations in several cities, two persons being wounded in encounters with the police.

Paris, June 9th.—The Executive Council of the League of Nations will meet in London on the fourteenth instant, to examine the request for the intervention of the League regarding the entry of the Bolsheviki into Persia.

Rome, June 9th.—Premier Nitti has announced the resignation of the Cabinet, and Signor Orlando, President of the Chamber, has resigned. The newspapers indicate that Signor Giolitti will succeed Signor Nitti as Premier.

Warsaw, June 9th.—The General Staff announces that the Polish counter-offensive between the Dwina and the Beresina is progressing rapidly. The Bolsheviki are resisting desperately and have sustained serious losses in killed, wounded and prisoners.

Paris, June 9th.—A Wolff Bureau despatch from Berlin states that of four hundred and sixty elections to the Reichstag, 110 are Majority Socialists, 80
