Flyers were greeted by General Menoher, Chief of Air Service, General Pershing, General March and other high Army officers.

LONDON: Official confirmation came from prison sources today. The report is that Lord Mayor MacSweeney had been fed during a period of unconsciousness. MacSweeney was delirious during virtually all last night, the delirium for the greater part of the night taking a violent form.
