EDITORIAL.

On the agenda for the meeting of the
Colonial Council today, there is a bill
which will be introduced by Hon. Joseph
Alexander, popular member for this
town, to provide that an ordinance be
enacted entitling any vessel engaged in
carrying the mail between Porto Rico
and Saint Croix, to free pilotage into and
out of the harbor of Christiansted. This
bill contemplates an advantage for the
whole island in that the mail-boat which
is now contracted to call at Frederiksted
and is at times unable to effect communi-

cation the owing to unfavorable seas,
may call at Christiansted and discharge
her mail without having to bear an ex-
pense for doing us that favor. The pro-
prietors of the Mystery have hitherto
shown a very co-operative spirit in
sending the boat here when she could
not dock at Frederiksted, incurring there-
by an expense of \$27 per trip for pilotage
in and out of this harbor, but she
is not obliged to call here on account of the
stress of weather precluding her going to
Frederiksted, and in order that the re-
ceipt and dispatch of the mails may not
be affected under the conditions which
must be reckoned with at times, it is
sought to make this port equally free to
mail vessels as far as pilotage is con-
cerned. Seeing that the mail-boat does
not call here now, and that no pilotage is
collected at Frederiksted, even if she did
call here once or twice a year there would
be practically no loss of revenue by the
operation of this ordinance.
